When our Board of Trustees updated the language in our mission statement three years ago, they focused on the attributes desired in our graduates. It is incredibly inspiring to see these qualities so evident in our alumnae community.

It is equally inspiring to experience the strong support of the alumnae community for the mission of Holy Names

Academy through their direct support and active service. Alumnae have been financially generous in all development efforts—annual giving, capital campaigns, endowment giving, and auctions. They also serve on school committees, the Alumnae and Parent Boards, and the Board of Trustees; volunteer at events; serve as speakers at graduation, Career Day, and other special occasions; and are directly involved in the school program as teachers, staff, administrators, and coaches. In other news, the HNA Cougars had a banner athletic season last fall. Golf and Soccer captured Metro League Championships, Swim & Dive took second, and Cross Country finished fourth. Crew re-qualified for the 2022 Head of the Charles Regatta in Boston, and Soccer finished third in State. And to top it all off, Swim & Dive were Academic State Champions.

We were also pleased to return fully to in-person learning this past fall. For the safety of all, we continue to have COVID protocols, masking, air filtration, and physical distancing as part of the daily school reality. With ingenuity and planning, we enjoyed a fall play, winter music concert, student assemblies, and the engagement of students in other activities such as Mock Trial and Robotics.

It has been a great joy to have the school filled with students again. I look forward to the time, hopefully soon, when alumnae and friends can gather again for special occasions at the Academy. And the good news: we will have ample parking for you in our new underground garage!

SERAFIMA HEALY '17 FOUNDER OF ZAVADILA

Serafima is a certified professional life coach and founder of Zavadila, a life-coaching organization that offers individual and group coaching, tools and resources, and events centered around youth empowerment.

Activities and Clubs at HNA:

HNA Class Rep; Rock Band; Jazz Band; Cougar Records; Do-it-Yourself Club; Golf; Tennis.

What is Zavadila's mission?

Zavadila's mission is to make young people feel heard, seen, and respected. I help young people build tools to advocate for themselves, feel comfortable expressing themselves, be financially articulate, and engage meaningfully in all types of relationships so they may thrive independently. My work revolves around the question: "How might the world be different if we took young people seriously?" I chose to name this project Zavadila because I am half Russian and the word 'zavadila' in Russian means "to inspire someone by being kind, cheerful, and confident."

What inspired you to start Zavadila?

I held a teaching fellowship with the Entrepreneurship and Innovation
Program at Western Washington
University where I worked with students in a classroom setting and one-on-one. I loved this work. To watch a student at the start of the program voice daydreams they had about their future and offer them the tools to make these dreams

come true was amazing! When the fellowship ended, I knew that this was the kind of work I had to keep doing. One of my professors was a certified professional coach and after participating in coaching sessions with him and several other coaches. I knew this is how I could continue this work. It's amazing to see transformation occur in someone's life in a matter of minutes during a coaching session—it feels like magic! In 2020, I began a certification program with the Coach Training Alliance to really understand, refine, and practice my coaching skills. Now I have the privilege of working with young adults in the ways I had envisioned. I was inspired to start Zavadila because I know that with the right tools, young people have the power to create meaningful change.

What does HNA's mission mean to you, and how does it live on?


When I read the Holy Names mission, I am reminded to know and act with my values. When we embrace our most individual authentic selves, we not only serve ourselves but also our immediate and global communities.

I see HNA's mission alive in the people

of our community. I see so many of the people in my graduating class advocating for justice and thinking critically about our local and global systems. One of my best friends is acting with purpose in her work with politics and communication, while another friend serves youth in the arts with complete compassion. I've caught up with a few of my former HNA teachers over Zoom and see how they lead by example during a pandemic with respect and integrity. And I see current HNA students confidently and courageously adapting to change.

What tools did you gain from HNA that you have carried with you?

I learned how important it is to have a place where you can practice asking for what you want. I did not realize it at the time, but a supportive space (like HNA) is the best place to practice asking for what you want. When you know your teachers are supporting your endeavors, it makes asking for things from authority less scary. I asked for a lot of things at HNA because I didn't feel shut down or intimidated. I've seen teens and young adults who have trouble asking for what they want—or even need—because perhaps

What is your primary focus at Leidos and the NETL? What do you hope to achieve as a research scientist?

My team at Leidos is producing research to inform our nation's energy infrastructure and environmental impact. I am currently working on projects that examine the integrity and safety of onshore oil and gas wells and larger offshore platforms in the Gulf of Mexico. We are looking at data to determine if these wells are working properly and if

they haven't had the space to practice asking for things, and it has really made me grateful for my time at HNA.

Who inspired you the most at HNA?

I am incredibly grateful for Ms. Weber, who made me feel heard, seen, and respected. She gave me the space to try out new things (like the HNA Rock Show) and connected me with opportunities in the big world. I really admire the way Ms. Weber taught me to practice confidence and life skills, while still allowing me to turn to her for guidance. I'd like to serve young adults the way she does. Learning from Ms. Weber felt like taking driver's

ed and going for a drive: You're the one behind the wheel, but you know you're going to be alright because someone who has their license also has a break and a gas pedal.

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not, how this can damage the environment. My team is using advanced analytics and machine learning to predict geohazards and incidents such as oil spills. We are also working on supporting the U.S. in our transition to clean energy through solutions such as carbon capture and storage.

What inspired you to pursue research for environmental

issues? I have always loved nature and taken environmental issues seriously. While studying environmental science at HNA, I became motivated by an initial feeling of environmental hopelessness. While I view the climate crisis as the largest problem my generation will face, I still have a sense of hope in human potential and want to work on solutions! I was driven to research by my desire to create a positive impact on our planet for generations to come.

What do you love most about your work? I love seeing the "big picture" impact that my work makes. Coming fresh out of undergrad into this career, I am constantly inspired by my coworkers and the work being done at the NETL. As an environmental and computer science double major, I use both sets of skills daily. I love seeing the power of technology and data analytics harnessed in pursuit of solutions to unsolved environmental problems.

How did HNA motivate you as a **student?** HNA provided an academic environment where I was able to learn about topics and tools that inspired me. My teachers promoted problem solving, being curious, and a love of learning that has stayed with me throughout college and into the

workforce. HNA also encourages an awareness of aligning your morals with how you live your life. This has motivated me to find interesting work that also has a positive impact.

How do you feel HNA's mission lives on through your work? I believe the HNA mission lives on in my ability to thrive in challenging educational and workplace environments. As the only female computer science major the year I graduated, I constantly needed to advocate for myself and other minorities

in STEM. I was the president of Women in Computing Club and founded a club for all gender minorities in STEM (STEM-GEMS). I credit HNA with instilling in me a sense of confidence in my knowledge and skills that has enabled me to think critically both about the environmental computer science work I do, and about how to increase access to fields traditionally dominated by men.

Who inspired you during your time at HNA, and who **inspires you today?** Ms. Smith and Ms. Shope were fabulous educators, role models of women in STEM, and incredibly encouraging of scientificallyminded students. I remember times when I seriously questioned my ability to grasp a concept or solve a problem and I was met first with kindness, and then support. Ms. Wahlen led the Theatre Department and is just an all-around star and the best cheerleader—reminding all of us that we are capable of doing very difficult work.

Today I am inspired by my professors-turned-mentors, Jennifer Granholm (the Secretary of Energy), climate activists, and the many people out there doing science on behalf of the planet.

What advice do you have for HNA **students?** Holy Names is full of bright and driven students, and it's hard to not compare yourself to the best. Often, I didn't feel like I was excelling in my favorite classes, and this was hard on my self-confidence. After leaving HNA, I realized that you don't have to be the best at what you want to do to pursue it. Strive for growth and meaning over perfection.

Mari is a Visual and Social Artist specializing in murals, community visioning through the arts, and scribing. Her work focuses on the intersection of public art activation, visual thinking, and creative empowerment, while inviting in the spirit of collaboration and connection.

Activities and Clubs at HNA:

Sport and Spirit—and I played a whole bunch of sports!

Can you tell us about your journey as an artist and muralist? What inspired you to pursue the arts?

The concept of healing inspired me to become an artist. Art has always been a space where I've found stillness, perspective, and the capacity to feel grounded in my body. I wanted to get to know art well enough to create space for others (specifically youth), to engage with their creativity and facilitate their own healing. I am inspired by the idea of service and seeing the role of artists to serve social transformation.

What do you love most about

what you do? I love that I am always getting to push myself and learn. I love that through my work, I get to learn more about the work within the community and to live into my values around creativity being a healing force for change. My goal within all that I produce is to create a context in which we can discover more about ourselves and the world.

Who inspired you during your time at HNA, and who inspires you today? Most definitely Ms. Anderson. The art room held a special place for me while I was at HNA. Today, Lily Yeh, the barefoot artist, is a community

muralist and artist who transforms public spaces into community art spaces through public art activation. She also deeply emphasizes healing and creative integration through the artwork she does in community. Community organizers like Naomi Davis coming out of Chicago, who are radically reimagining the "village" in a way that centers affinity space and sustainability, are gold in my book.

What does HNA's mission mean to you? "Act with purpose"—the act of painting is a culmination of decisions you have made to represent a certain idea. Your life is a work of art in this way. It is the composite of decisions you

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made. To act with purpose to me is to embrace the agency and choice you have in every moment and to take full responsibility, full accountability for your life and the experience you are having while you are here. I lift up and celebrate the way HNA emphasizes this in the education it provides. I think the biggest way we can support ourselves in acting with purpose is to clearly identify our values and whenever you are doing something in your life, check in with how does this align with my values? Is this

action supporting me in growing in this area? Is this action bringing me joy? If it is not, what is it bringing me? We must be intentional with our lives and when things fall apart (which they do), show ourselves grace and allow the putting back together to be a creative and messy act.

What advice do you have for HNA students? Be kind to yourself. Listen to your intuition and your heart (when you ask yourself questions, a part of you will respond). Listen to what brings you

joy and brings you peace. Our world is changing drastically at this time, and we need leadership in unexpected areas. Love yourself—it is the greatest relationship you will ever have. Hold your dreams in the front by creating a life that is in line with your values. Ask for help—you have elders in your community who will support you.

FOUNDER OF BEAUTIFULLE [/'BYOODIFLE/]

Leonetta is a Spiritual Director who founded Beautifulle in 2019—an online resource and space where people of color and their allies can spiritually reflect and help one another. She is also a Program Officer with the Marguerite Casey Foundation, which supports leaders and initiatives committed to racial justice, change, and community organizing. Leonetta has worked in community and youth development for nearly 20 years and "thrives at the intersection of culture, faith, and justice."

ADVOCATE FOR JUSTICE

Activities and Clubs at HNA:

Co-Founder of Black Student Union (BSU); former Alumnae Board member; Drama Club; Cross Country and Track; ASB Officer.

Tell us about your background in philanthropy and community and youth development. What has this journey been like for you?

Whereas some people start a journey with a clear roadmap and directions, there are others who figure out the destination as they journey along. That would be me. Following my passion for young people, I started working in direct service programming with young people of color. That led me to realize that the challenges young people were facing were systemic and that for young people to thrive, they needed more than a great after-school program or youth group—they needed a healthy, vibrant community. This realization led me to community development work. That ultimately led me to philanthropy. Throughout the journey of my vocational work, what has been consistent are the threads of faith, community, and justice.

What was the spark behind your desire to start Beautifulle in 2019?

Beautifulle (pronounced beauty fully) creates a space for contemplatives, aesthetes, people of color, and their allies to find experiences for reflection and resources to live a life in awareness of the beauty that I believe is always present, even in the midst of hard things. It is meant to offer resources and support for contemplative living—more awakened living—that feels culturally relevant and inclusive for people of color who are often not centered or reflected in many contemplative spaces.

The vision to birth this space really came from my own experiences in spiritual communities—mostly predominantly white—that were both life changing and, in many ways, lacked cultural relevance for me. Whenever I experience something good, I want to share it and I think, "Who is being left out?" or "Who doesn't have access?" As I benefited from contemplative practices like meditation and spiritual direction, I realized that most of the practitioners leading in the space did not look like me

or reflect my experiences. It was a gap in the field that I thought I could step into and offer contemplative practices in a more culturally relevant way, allowing more people like me to feel seen and reflected in the space.

What inspired you to pursue the nonprofit realm and social justice

work? One of the things I was taught by my family and community is to not put my drive for personal success over the success of the collective. We are all intrinsically linked. This was reinforced in my time at HNA. Encouragement to think critically about the world around me led to deeper curiosity and compassion for the world.

Fundamentally, I believe we can be better humans. We can meet each other's needs and ensure everyone in our society can thrive through the redistribution of our time, talent, and treasure in ways that lift up those in society who are being left out and marginalized, disproportionately and most significantly BIPOC people.

LEONETTA ESPY ELAIHO '98

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What do you love most about what you do? I love seeing people—really seeing them. No matter what age you are, what your socio-economic status is, what your race or ethnicity is, we are all having a human experience. I have shared meals with the wealthiest of the wealthy and people experiencing extreme poverty—many would call them the poorest of the poor. The role of faith or religion in my work and life is to look for the Divine in all living people and things—to welcome and engage them as I would Christ. This fuels me to do the work I do with dignity for all and a profound respect for others.

What tools did you gain from HNA that you have carried with you?

HNA provided a space for me as a young woman to use my voice, to try out leadership in new ways. Whether it was advocating for Black students and forming HNA's first BSU, or directing a play in Drama, or serving in leadership on ASB, HNA provided a space for learning that allowed me to try, fail, and succeed at many things. It's also where I formed friendships with women who are still some of my closest friends today.

Who inspired you the most at

HNA? There were so many formidable teachers at HNA who shaped my experience. Mrs. Herlich's laughter and joy made drama a serious discipline I wanted to work hard at.

Mrs. Kaz gave me her personal copy of Jean Toomer's *Cane* after discussing Black authors and their absence in my AP American Literature class. Ms. Dawson opened up her home and served dinner to me, my friends, and our dates before junior prom. And of course, there was Sr. Rosemary, whose kindness and laughter fueled so many women who are out there now changing the world. I am grateful for all of these teachers and so many more.

What advice do you have for HNA students? Institutions like HNA are only as relevant and viable as the animating forces within them. That's

overwhelmingly you, students! The mission of HNA cannot be achieved without you. Your passion, interests, and peculiarities—what breaks your heart in the world and what moves you in the depths of your soul—is what you must bring and leverage to help make HNA fully live into its mission in powerful ways. You benefit from this wonderful school, but it also benefits from you. Continue to speak your mind, raise your voice, and be the change you want to see in the community of HNA and in the world.

DOROTHY ROUTT, RN '03

DIRECTOR OF NURSING, VA HOSPITAL

Dorothy is the Director of Nursing at the VA Puget Sound, and she was selected to lead the COVID-19 vaccine clinic at the VA. She also spent one year at the nonprofit Valley Cities, opening an inpatient facility on Beacon Hill that offers detoxification and recovery services for homeless and low-income patients with mental health, substance, and opioid addictions.

Activities and Clubs at HNA:

Soccer; Cross Country.

What inspired you to pursue a career in nursing and healthcare?

When I started college, my goal was to major in a subject that would allow me to get a job directly out of school so that I could eventually move on to pursue a master's degree and become a Registered Dietician (my ultimate career goal at the time). Nursing gave me a solid science base, and I was interested in learning more about the human body as a whole. Once I started nursing school and eventually began working as a student nurse at the VA on the inpatient psychiatry unit, I realized I was passionate about caring for veterans and mental health, so I ended up making a career out of it. I eventually received my master's in health systems management in order to pursue a management position, with the goal of obtaining skills to change systems to benefit patients and staff.

What would you like people to know about the type of treatment and services you offer to veterans

at the VA? I have had several roles within the VA—an inpatient psychiatry staff nurse, outpatient mental health clinic staff nurse, mental health nurse educator, and now a nursing director—allowing me to work with a wonderful multidisciplinary team within the mental health services. In my current role, I work with our outpatient medical-surgical clinics, acute inpatient

discharge planning team, and our infusion clinics. At the beginning of the COVID pandemic, I was tasked with collaborating with the Nursing Education team and two Nurse Managers to uptrain our outpatient nursing team, creating a labor pool trained to support our inpatient units in case of a COVID surge. I worked with the labor pool closely, creating a surge preparation plan to activate and deactivate our labor pool based on need. I transitioned to working with a dedicated team to create a mass vaccination clinic administering the COVID vaccine to as many staff and veterans (as well as spouses and caregivers) as quickly as possible. We provided vaccines to approximately 40,000 veterans. My experience outside the VA, at Valley Cities, was incredibly rewarding and unique as well. I worked with a team to open a 33-bed inpatient detox facility and helped start a medication-assisted community health program for individuals seeking access to recovery services.

What is the most rewarding part of your job? I had a recent experience that really highlights for me why I am a nurse and why I work in mental health. I was on vacation in Denver over the summer and went to a baseball game. The person seated next to me started making small talk, and it turns out he is a veteran who gets his care at his local VA facility. We spent the entire game talking about his PTSD and struggles with


substance use and how the VA mental health providers supported him. He said he was so grateful for the VA embracing and quickly offering the COVID vaccine to veterans as well as their spouses and caregivers. The entire experience was very meaningful.

What tools did you gain from HNA that you have carried with you?

HNA was academically challenging and set very high expectations for the students. I am grateful that I learned tools such as prioritization, organization, and general discipline. I think HNA prepared me to approach challenging situations strategically and ultimately excel. I felt overwhelmed at times while at HNA, so I also learned the value of

setting boundaries and setting selfcare as a priority.

What does HNA's mission mean to you, and how does it live on? Especially right now, as the COVID pandemic and vaccines have become so politicized, I think HNA's mission of leading with

integrity, advocating for justice, and serving with compassion are especially critical. As a healthcare professional, I am obligated to provide accurate and up-to-date information to my clients, so that they can make the best choice for their health and their community's health. Leading the COVID Vaccine Clinic, I provided my staff with the tools to do this for every person that walked into our clinic. The staff strongly believe in the clinic mission and lead with integrity and compassion.

Who inspired you during your time at HNA, and who inspires you today?

Ms. Shaddy taught me English and history. She was so passionate about both those subjects and never seemed like the "typical" teacher. I could tell work was not everything to her, but she really loved her job as well. At the time I thought that was "cool" and in retrospect realize that is what I aspired to be as an adult. My job can be very demanding, and there have been days and months of working 16-hour days, seven-day weeks, but I will always strive to be passionate about my work and have a life beyond work. I have a wonderful family, and they motivate me today.

What advice do you have for HNA students? Hold onto your high school friendships that continue to grow with you and support you. HNA can be very challenging in many ways, but getting the foundation of academic discipline will serve you well in life. Not everything in high school defines your future, even if it feels that way right now.



As an undergraduate at Washington State University, Jai worked in the Admissions Office to help pay her tuition and continued working there full-time following her graduation. After spending three years at WSU, Jai moved to Washington, D.C., to work at Howard University. In 2001, she returned to Seattle to accept a position at the University of Washington's Foster School of Business. Jai spent the next 11 years building the Foster School's Undergraduate Diversity Services, a comprehensive set of college access and development programs for students of color. In 2013, she transitioned out of higher education and took a role at Seattle City Light's Human Resources Department as the Talent & Workforce Development Director. In 2021, Jai accepted a directorlevel position at Microsoft as the Corporate Functions Practice Leader on the Global Diversity & Inclusion Team.

Activities and Clubs at HNA: Multicultural Student Union; Student Ambassador; Student Body President; participated in the Jonestown Mission Trip in the summer of '90.

Can you tell us about your background in organizational policy and leadership, and what inspired you to pursue your passion? Leadership has been a constant thread in my life. Whether it was a job, service activity, or role in a club, I have always been one to volunteer to lead a project or solve a problem. When I was at HNA, that took the form of clubs and volunteer opportunities. As a professional, it shows up in my daily work and role as President of the Seattle Alumnae Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated. Alpha Kappa Alpha was founded on January 15, 1908, on the campus of Howard University and is the



first Black Greek-letter organization for women. Alpha Kappa Alpha is dedicated to service and making an ongoing and sustained impact in the African American community. I have an innate need to be working to improve the lived experiences of others. I can see the pattern in my volunteer opportunities, higher education career, work in Human Resources, and Microsoft.

What do you love the most about working in the diversity and inclusion space? Hove

working in this space because systemic barriers have restricted access for people of color to many opportunities. The tech industry is not immune to this, and I am proud to work in a place that acknowledges these barriers and is dedicated to correcting them.

What does HNA's mission mean to you, and how does it live on? I came to HNA as a 15-year-old trying to figure out life, and honestly, I was headed in the wrong direction. I lived the HNA mission firsthand. My classmates, faculty, and administration embraced me and saw my potential when I could not. When I first climbed the front staircase and walked through the door, it brought out the best in me. I found my voice, confidence, desire, and ability to be a leader. Leading with integrity is a core value and something I strive to do in every aspect of my life.

What tools did you gain from HNA that you have carried with you?

To be of service. It is part of the school's mission interwoven into your high school years. While I was at Holy Names, I had so many meaningful service memories. My favorite was spending the summer in Jonestown, Mississippi, teaching summer school. I had no idea that experience would have a lasting impact. That summer would be the first time I would see and experience overt racism, bigotry, and inequality firsthand. I was confronted with my personal privilege and faced with the harsh reality of life for so many. I will forever be changed by the work of the Sisters of Holy Names. It is hard to express Sister Kay and Sister Teresa's impact on my life. It was a paradigm-shifting moment, and I am eternally grateful for the experience.

Who inspired you the most at

HNA? Sr. Rosemary has always supported me and has been my biggest champion. Many alumnae feel this way as this is her special gift. She would invite me to come and talk to her classes and share my personal story. She saw value in my past experience before I recognized it, allowing me to see how mistakes can lead to future successes. The lessons are in that journey.

Ms. Du Pen and Mrs. Herlich. It is hard to think of one without the other. They were always together and the most loving, inspiring set of

teachers I have ever had. They saw me for who I was and pushed me to grow into the woman I am today. I thought about running for Student Body President in my junior year and was discouraged from doing so. I mentioned it to them, and they would not allow the seed of doubt to take root. They demanded that I try. I did and won and am forever grateful for their impact on my life.

What advice do you have for HNA students? The advice that I would give HNA students is to trust the process. HNA is a fantastic place that is preparing you for college and beyond. Take every opportunity to push yourself to grow, remember we all have a responsibility to make the world a better place, and have faith that the path you are on will take you exactly where you are meant to be.

Sr. Mary Annette Dworshak, SNJM truly embodies a "commitment to mission," dedicating her career in service to HNA and shaping the

lives of young women for decades. She retired from the Academy at the conclusion of the 20-21 academic year after 47 years as a distinguished member of the English and Theology faculty and steward of HNA's peace and justice work. HNA's longest-tenured faculty member, Sr. Mary Annette left an indelible mark on the Academy and ensures her legacy will continue serving

students with a planned estate gift. Sr. Mary Annette reflects on her inspiration for joining the Legacy Society.

Why do you value Catholic education? My parents sold their property in southeastern Montana to move to Miles City so that their daughters could attend Sacred Heart Grade School. My mom, as my third-grade teacher, was one of the first lay teachers there in the history of Catholic education. For 25 years, my mom devoted her life to her family and also to her role as a Catholic teacher.

What is the privilege of being an educator? As a teacher at Holy Names Academy for 47 years, I realize the gift it is to work with students, their families, and my colleagues. Not many of us have the daily opportunities to invite students to research ideas, ponder questions, and engage in intense conversations, often leading to collaboration with others to bring about change.

What is the hope of a legacy gift to Holy Names Academy? In light of my family heritage, the charism of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, and the mission of Holy Names Academy, the Dworshak legacy is a treasure to be shared from generation to generation. My family investments are a blessing to enable young women to discover their passion, to realize their potential, to develop their leadership skills, and to advocate for justice.


