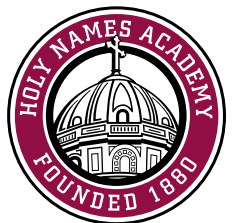

# FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL & PRINCIPAL



Dear Alumnae and Friends,

Having graduated from HNA before Title IX and all the doors it opened for women in sports, I take great pleasure in knowing that our students today have no limits in the athletic opportunities available to them. They can, and do, compete at the highest levels of high school sports, and many go on to compete at the collegiate level—earning college admissions and scholarships based on their success in high school athletics.

More importantly, HNA encourages and supports students in developing a commitment to lifetime fitness and health—as they also grow their academic and artistic interests and talents. Sports teach students the value of teamwork, healthy competition, goal setting, perseverance, and training. They also provide opportunities for our students to learn important life lessons—how to win with honor, lose with grace, and support teammates with compassion—through circumstances that can be challenging.

In the early years of HNA's participation in the Metro League, I had the pleasure of serving as the varsity softball coach—one of only a few female teacher-coaches at the Academy in the early 1980s. It took years for Title IX to fully impact the scope of our program. After all, until the door was opened for women to compete in collegiate and high school sports,

the pool of female teacher-coaches was limited. I will never forget the amazing women on my teams, and I am so proud to see all the alumnae and female faculty members coaching in our program today!

I hope you enjoy the cover article in this issue of *Columns*, which gives you a glimpse into the transformation of our athletic program since the enactment of Title IX in 1972. With our athletes competing today in 17 different sports across multiple levels of teams, there is an opportunity for every student—from Ultimate Frisbee to Crew to Basketball. And our students are highly competitive and successful. In every year since 2008, HNA has won the coveted Metro League's All-Sports Trophy for the highest average finish in all league sports combined—except for the two pandemic years, when the sports seasons were suspended or shortened. Go Cougars!

On a different note, I extend my deep gratitude to everyone who supported our recent Deck the Dome celebration. Thanks to our generous community, we raised over \$150,000 for our growing Theatre and Film Department—another wonderful program that provides a wholistic education for our students and an outlet for their creative talents.

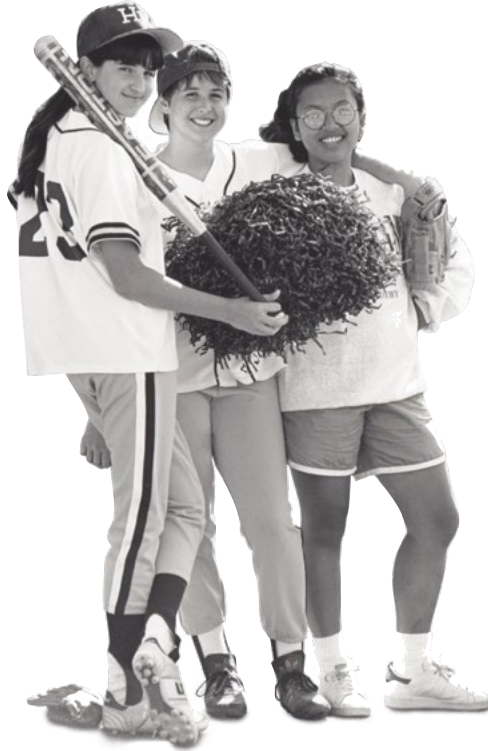
# CELEBRATING 50 YEARS OF TITLE IX AND ITS IMPACT ON HOLY NAMES ACADEMY

As Holy Names Academy celebrates the 50th anniversary of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 ("Title IX"), we reflect on the significant impact this transformative legislation has had on HNA's athletic program and student athletes.

Title IX is a federal regulation prohibiting sex-based discrimination in any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. When it was enacted in 1972, Title IX required an end to sex-based bias against women in the educational system, which included athletics. Colleges and universities

began to examine and rectify the funding discrepancies between their men's and women's athletics programs. Many colleges and universities established women's teams for the first time, with athletics becoming a realistic avenue for women to earn scholarships for college. As a result, the increasing

demand for athletic opportunities for women trickled down to the high-school level nationwide and likewise, at Holy Names Academy, which has seen its program grow from intramural play before Title IX, to league competitions across 17 sports today.



## HNA'S ATHLETIC PROGRAM PRIOR TO TITLE IX

Although few opportunities existed for female athletes before Title IX, Holy Names Academy had long been breaking the mold by providing athletic programming for its students. HNA had operated for 92 years before Title IX became law, and while the athletic program was small—in keeping with societal norms of the times—students competed against each other in intramural games. The HNA Chronicles—records the Sisters kept of daily happenings at the school—first mention an intramural basketball competition in 1932. Given that HNA did not have its own gymnasium at the time, the season's final playoffs between the different class years took place in Seattle Preparatory School's Garrigan Gymnasium. These interclass competitions continue today as the Rose Games in HNA's gymnasium. Recognizing the importance of providing athletic opportunities to its students, HNA added volleyball to the

Garrigan Games by 1945. Net proceeds from these tournaments funded sports equipment, among other improvements to the school.

Decades of intramural competitions are documented throughout HNA's yearbooks—volleyball and basketball players donning skirts as they dribble and spike. A two-page spread in the 1971 yearbook titled, "Sports," emphasized that PE class was a way to work together and celebrate success, while also noting "low gym ceilings can be a nuisance." Many alumnae will, of course, understand this reference to HNA's first gymnasium, which was located on the first floor of the school's main building and is now the Orchestra Room.

## HNA'S ATHLETES SOAR AFTER TITLE IX ENACTED

Nationally, women's participation in sports has grown exponentially since the enactment of Title IX in 1972, and the increase of women in athletics at HNA has been no different. In 1974,

HNA joined the Sea-Tac League, competing in basketball, volleyball, tennis, soccer, and softball. The school joined the Seattle Metropolitan Sports League ("Metro League") in 1979 to compete with other Seattle-area schools. Today, Holy Names Academy holds 15 Metro League "All Sports" trophies, 18 State titles, 31 District titles, 75 Metro League titles, and 26 State 3A Academic titles. Supported by a dedicated Athletic Department, coaching staff, and state-of-the-art athletic complex, more than 80% of the student body compete in at least one of the 17 sports HNA offers. Each year, about 20 student athletes commit to continue their sport at a collegiate level. Student athletes consistently report gaining valuable life skills they use far beyond the court or field.

These sentiments have been echoed by alumnae athletes Marissa Valdivia Reagle '17 and Imani Apostol '15, who credit their involvement in HNA



athletics with teaching them leadership, accountability, and dedication. Marissa recalls, “HNA taught me to be a fighter, work hard for everything, and to capitalize on opportunities.” Marissa competed in three sports—basketball, soccer, and softball—while attending both HNA and the University of Maine at Presque Isle. She is currently working towards an MBA in Cybersecurity. Imani ran track for HNA and became a D1 All-American at the University of Washington. Reflecting on her involvement in HNA athletics, Imani notes, “It gave me the confidence in building relationships with people outside of my social group, which resulted in lifelong relationships. This skill has proven to be especially helpful in building my career. Some of my best, heartwarming memories stem

from HNA track, and I cannot envision a world where female athletes do not have the same opportunities as males.” Imani currently works as a Product Designer at Microsoft.

The remarkable rise of Holy Names Academy’s athletic program is inspiring, not only because of the many trophies that line the lobby of the school’s Mary Herche Pavilion, but also because of the dedication of the school community, Athletic Department, and talented coaching staff, who help cultivate the leadership, sportsmanship, resilience, and confidence that HNA’s young women carry with them well beyond their years under the Dome.

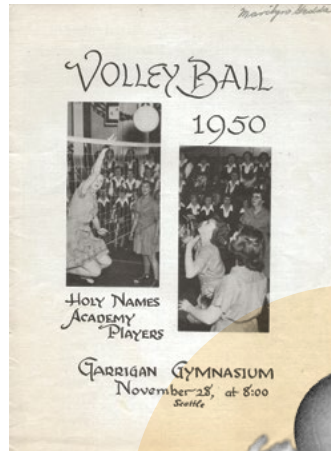

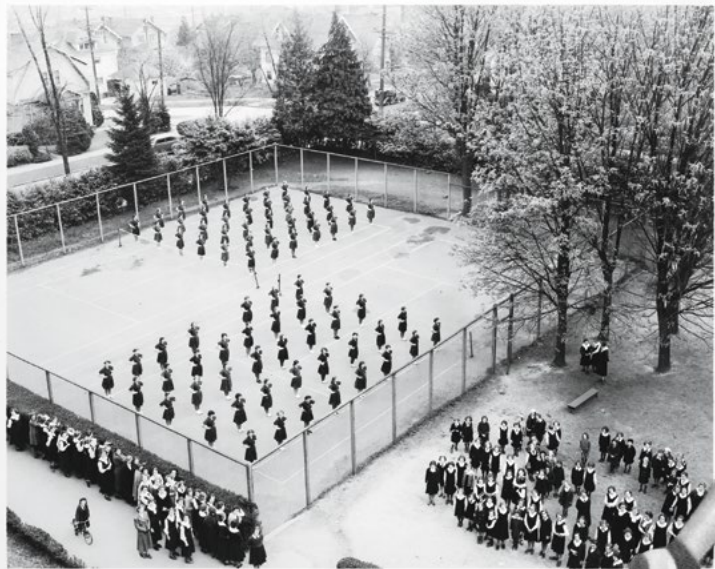

## DR. TRACY HILLIARD '95 GIVES COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS TO CLASS OF 2022 AT BENAROYA HALL

The Class of 2022 celebrated their Commencement at Benaroya Hall in May 2022. HNA was honored to welcome Dr. Tracy Hilliard '95 to give the commencement address. An incredibly involved alumna throughout the years, Dr. Hilliard has served on HNA's Alumnae Board and campaign committees and has regularly attended alumnae events. Dr. Hilliard is the Director of the Center for Culturally Responsive Engagement (CCRE) at the Michigan Public Health Institute. In this role, she works with communities to

advance racial equity and justice through organizational development, strategic planning, training, and evaluation. She is a graduate of the inaugural cohort of the Annie E. Casey Foundation's Leaders in Equitable Evaluation and Diversity (LEEAD) program, designed to produce doctoral-trained evaluators committed to advancing equity and social justice for children and families. Dr. Hilliard holds a B.A. in Sociology, Master's in Public Health, and Ph.D. in Health Services from the University of Washington.

At the end of her speech, Dr. Hilliard gave the Class of 2022 these parting words: "This is your time. This is your moment. Have fun and choose joy. You will be called to share your faith, leadership, academic skills, and strengths. You will be called to foster and nurture relationships, and uphold the legacy of Holy Names Academy, one of excellence that has been instilled in you and over 11,000 other women since 1880. Sometimes the calls will be direct and sometimes they will be indirect. And when they come, be ready."

This year, HNA invited donors and volunteers to join Head of School and Principal Liz Swift '71 and the Board of Trustees for an evening of connection in celebration of HNA's important mission. They heard remarks from Liz Swift '71, Development Director Anne Bulchis '98, Chair of the Annual Giving Steering Committee Barbara Mockett, and keynote speaker Amanda Gehman '08.

In attending HNA, Amanda followed in the footsteps of her maternal

grandmother and great aunt who also went to the Academy, but as elementary students. After graduating, Amanda completed bachelor's and master's degrees in Civil Engineering at the University of Washington and then began work in 2014 as an Engineer at Coughlin Porter Lundeen. During her speech, Amanda explained that she "had the great joy of being on the structural engineering team for the new athletic complex and parking garage," which HNA opened in 2021.

Amanda described her love for engineering that grew from STEM classes at HNA, her fond memories of student life at the Academy, and her experience as a recipient of financial aid at HNA: "Receiving financial aid to attend Holy Names Academy never felt like it had to be some secret. We

were not going to be ostracized by our peers for not being able to afford the full tuition amount. When I established myself in my career, I wanted to be sure to continue that support for the next generation. One of the biggest lessons I took from my time at HNA was always make it better for the next girl. I have tried to embody that spirit of service in both my personal and professional life. So, thank you for helping make it better for the next girl. Whether you give your time, your money, or your expertise, you help make this school a place where young women can shine."

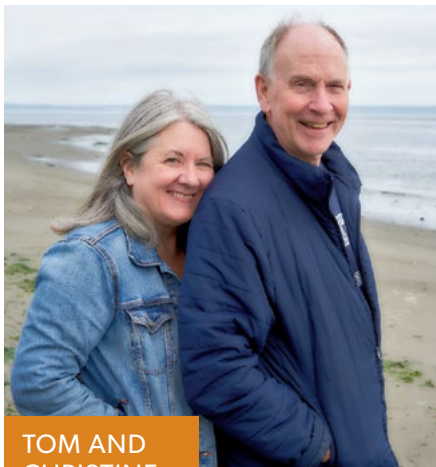

## HOLY NAMES ACADEMY'S ONGOING COMMITMENT TO DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION, AND JUSTICE

Holy Names Academy's commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice (DEIJ) has been highlighted in recent editions of *Columns* and in its DEIJ Plan, *In Pursuit of Right Relationships*. DEIJ work is ongoing and evolving, and this plan will guide the Academy as it continues this work with an anti-racist lens. The Academy's recent DEIJ efforts include the following:

- The school formed the **DEIJ Advisory Committee** to guide the implementation of the DEIJ Plan.
- The **Multicultural Student Union (MSU)**, a long-standing club, now includes four student officers, who lead the newly appointed MSU homeroom representatives.
- HNA revised the student **dress code** to be more inclusive.
- Faculty members read and discussed ***Grading for Equity* by Joe Feldman** throughout the school year, and each department implemented changes to grading policies.
- HNA partnered with several local, independent schools to offer the **Equity & Inclusion Virtual Speaker Series**, designed to offer its community an opportunity to learn and engage in topics around equity, inclusion, and antiracist education.
- HNA partnered with the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS) to conduct the **AIM (Assessment of Inclusivity and**

- Multiculturalism) Survey** of its current families, students, faculty/staff, and recent alumnae. The DEIJ Advisory Committee is using survey results to identify HNA's strengths and opportunities for growth.
- Each department within the school has been meeting to identify and implement **department-specific DEIJ goals**.

Holy Names Academy is a part of my estate plan in large part because of Marion Sullivan, Class of '53, past member and President of the Board of Trustees.

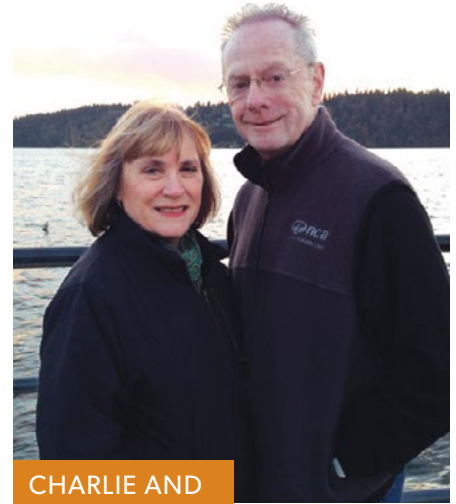

An energetic and ready-to-gather crowd of parents, alumnae, faculty, staff, and friends attended the annual CHEER Auction at Holy Names Academy. "There's No Place Like Home, Under the Dome" was the theme for the lively event—the first CHEER to take place in the new Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Athletic Complex.

With the help of generous guests, donors, and sponsors, more than \$186,000 net was raised to enhance and sustain the Academy's excellent academic, arts, athletic, spiritual, and leadership programs. In addition, HNA received more than \$86,000 in donations towards the Funded Item to upgrade security cameras and to replace the 10-year-old Wi-Fi currently installed in the main school building.

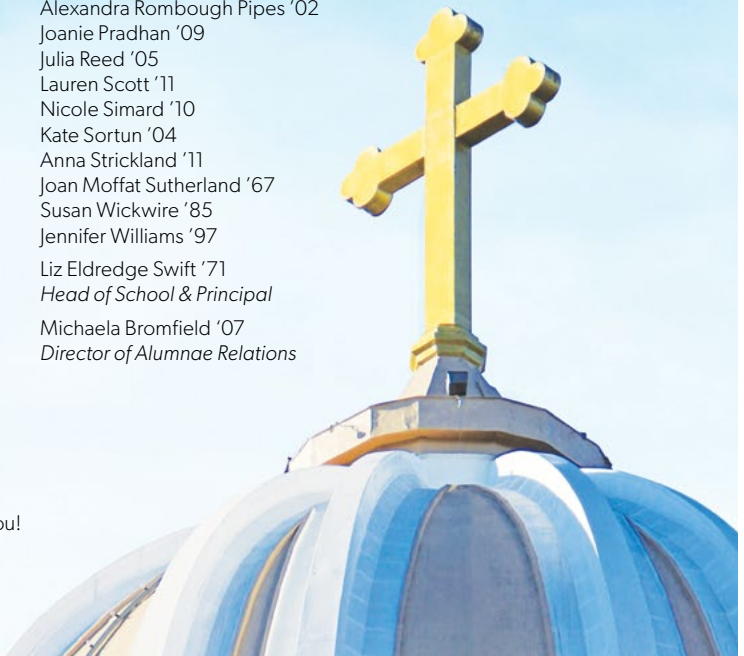

LEADING WITHOUT LIMITS

KAREN SNOWDEN '13, M.S.W.

Karen Snowden '13, M.S.W. is an Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Therapist at Navos, a community mental health agency located in Seattle. She also works as an Early Childhood Mental Health Consultant and spends time in preschool and Head Start classrooms to support teachers in meeting the social-emotional and mental health needs of their students. A dedicated, passionate professional, Karen is currently participating in an Advanced Clinical Training Program through the Barnard Center for Infant Mental Health at the University of Washington.

**WHAT LEADERSHIP POSITIONS AND EXPERIENCES HAVE YOU HELD SINCE YOUR TIME AT HNA?**

Following my time at HNA, I attended Santa Clara University, where I had many opportunities to engage in social justice leadership roles. I was one of the Community Development Fellows through the Ignatian Center, where I was placed at a community education center for the year. I was also part of the Catholic Relief Services Student Ambassador program and was the president of our chapter during my final year at Santa Clara. These experiences in community development and social justice led me to join the Jesuit Volunteer Corps following graduation. I lived in a community with seven other volunteers in Cleveland, Ohio, and worked as a Youth Advocate at a domestic violence shelter. I am fortunate enough to continue to be part of the Jesuit Volunteer Community as a Former Jesuit Volunteer BIPOC mentor. My time in JVC greatly influenced my decision to continue my education at the University of Washington, where I earned a master's degree in social work in the Children, Youth and Families concentration. Additionally, I am participating in an Advanced Clinical Training Program through the Barnard Center for Infant Mental Health at the



University of Washington so that I can continue to gain knowledge and skills to best serve families with young children.

**WHAT IS THE BEST PART OF SERVING IN A LEADERSHIP ROLE?**

For me, the best part of being in a leadership role is being in a position to create change and to bring others together around a common goal. I have been fortunate enough to work alongside other passionate and driven individuals who are committed to making the world a better place, and I love being able to see how everyone is able to use their unique skills and gifts to contribute to a shared vision. Throughout my life, I saw my parents and my sisters live out their values as leaders in service to others. As a social worker and mental health professional, I can support others in reaching their goals and overcoming barriers, whether that is due to poverty, systemic oppression, trauma, mental health challenges, or other forms of marginalization. While there are so many hardships in the world today, collaborating with others to find ways to make changes, big or small, fills me with hope and motivation. It also inspires me to bring others into the field and support their growth and well-being

so that they are able to lead and share their gifts.

**HOW DID HNA HELP YOU?**

HNA offered so many opportunities for me to explore my passions and interests and to connect with others in an environment that was uplifting and supportive. As a quieter student, I appreciated the ways that I was encouraged to find my voice and use my skills to create change in our school and community. I realized there are many ways to be a leader—that true leadership involves collaboration and commitment to bringing out the skills and strengths in those around you. At HNA, I truly realized my potential and responsibility to work toward a more just world, and this continues to shape my education and vocation today.

I remember being on the Social Justice Committee throughout my time at HNA and how energizing it was to meet with other team members to discuss issues like accessibility to clean water, human trafficking, unjust labor practices, and immigration. Not only were we challenged academically to learn about issues facing society and our world, but we were also given tools to figure out ways to use our power and privilege to create change.

**WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE YOUNG PEOPLE WHO ARE INTERESTED IN YOUR WORK?**

My advice for students and upcoming leaders would be to explore your interests and passions and let that inform where you can make a difference in the world. The world needs leaders who are energized and passionate, and who are able to be authentic; that's what inspires others to grow, lead, and create change. In order to share your strengths with the others and the world, you need to be healthy and surrounded by people, and things, that fill your cup.

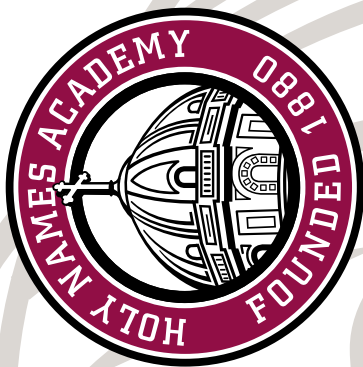

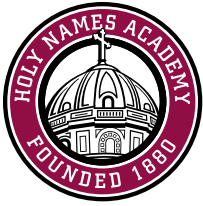
