Dear Alumnae and Friends,

s generations of our alumnae community will attest, Holy Names Academy has always had strong academic offerings that prepare its students for college and life. The development of our Advanced Placement program has strengthened the opportunities for our young women to access challenging and engaging courses—and, as you can see from the information in the lead article in this issue of *Columns*, our students excel in all subjects. Here are a few more powerful facts about our program and our graduates:

- 66% of the graduating Class of 2012 received an AP Scholar Award for high scores on multiple exams.
- In the Class of 2012, 98% sat for at least one AP Exam and 95% of those graduates earned a score of 3 or above on one or more exams.
- 88% of the Class of 2013 collectively earned over \$28.4 million in college scholarships, with over \$6.2 million actually being used to finance college tuitions.

How are HNA students able to achieve such a high level of success? I would contend that academic achievement is one of the primary advantages of an all-girls school. Add in the SNJM charism that promotes an inclusive, supportive, and welcoming school culture, and a winning environment is created where young women thrive. Students grow academically and personally when they take risks and stretch their comfort zone. The very essence of our mission is to provide a program that encourages young women to discover and develop their talents and interests.

Another undeniable factor in the academic success of HNA students is an accomplished faculty that is student-centered and interested in facilitating the growth of every student. HNA has many outstanding Advancement Placement teachers, but the success of the program begins the day a student enters the Academy. Teachers of students at every level identify the skills needed for success, then work to ensure that students are prepared for advanced study. What happens in a 9th-grade English or algebra class sets the stage for student success later in 12th-grade AP English Literature or AP Calculus.

Early access to Advanced Placement courses also gives students an opportunity to develop the critical-thinking skills needed for advanced work. Our philosophy at HNA is not to wait until students are juniors or seniors, but to encourage the 10th-grade students, as they are ready, to access the AP program through courses such as AP Biology, AP World History, AP Psychology, AP Computer Science, AP Art History, AP Statistics, or AP Music Theory. In 2012, 53% of our 10th graders completed an Advanced Placement course in which they honed their skills of analysis, critical reading, and problem solving.

A great joy of my time at Holy Names Academy has been to teach in the Advanced Placement program, first AP Calculus and now AP Physics. The young women at the Academy are amazing—as are my wonderful colleagues who have prepared them so well for success.

For an amazing six years in a row, dating to 2007-2008, Cougar athletes in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track, and volleyball have combined to engrave another year of dominance onto the All Sports Trophy. In honor of this year's achievement, Sport and Spirit student leaders organized a surprise visit from a Schwan's Ice Cream truck with treats for the entire school.

hat a spring it was to be a Cougar in 2013! Spring-sport teams of Holy Names Academy put a series of exclamation points on another solid athletic year overall — one in which Cougar teams combined to win a sixth consecutive Metro League All Sports Trophy.

Crew celebrated the 20th anniversary of HNA rowing with a sensational performance against America's best: at the USRowing Youth Nationals in Oak Ridge, TN in June, all three Cougar boats competing finished among the top 10 in the nation, led by the silver medal awarded in the Varsity 4+ finals to HNA's Louisa Abel '14, Marlee Blue '15, Katy Gillingham'15, Gemma Holt '13, and Emmy Bateman '13. HNA's Lightweight 8+ also reached the coveted finals round, finishing sixth, while the Varsity 4x finished ninth in the nation. Earlier, at the NW Junior District Championship regatta in Vancouver, WA, Cougar boats won a record 14 medals and finished second among all the women's teams competing.


HNA **track & field**, with only seven athletes competing, won second place overall at the WIAA State tournament,

including a pair of individual firsts for CeCe Jackson '13 in 100-meter and 300-meter hurdles. In the latter race, Olivia Vincent '14 was second only to her teammate, and the two were half of the HNA quartet to take gold in the 4x100 relay, along with Nia Johnson '13 and Imani Apostol '15. Cougar **tennis** likewise took the team second-place trophy at State, paced by an individual second in singles

(Catherine Allen '14) and fourth (Cello Lockwood '15). Varsity **softball** won the WIAA Academic State Championship (the third Academic State title for HNA softball in six years), won second in the Sea-King District tournament, and rolled to a 16–0 Metro League regular-season record. **Golf** qualified four athletes to the State tournament, where HNA finished eighth overall.

What vacation?

his summer, more than a third of the 54 Holy Names Academy students who took Advanced Placement Computer Science in the 2012-2013 school year are working in paid internship positions at high-tech powerhouses including Microsoft, Google, and Seattle-based Cobalt. Three students are helping guide summer technology camps for middle-school and high-school girls run by the University of Washington's Computer Science & Engineering Department.

These young women aren't even waiting for college to reap the benefits of their school's laser-like focus on offering an Advanced Placement (AP) program second to none.

"The fact that Holy Names offers a wide variety of AP classes," says recent graduate Alycia Gardner '11, "allowed me to challenge myself while in high school, and to explore all of my interests in a way

that I might not have been able to otherwise." Gardner, a junior at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is majoring in Biological Engineering, a path she attributes to the rigors of AP at the Academy, particularly her AP Biology course.

"If I had gone to a school where AP classes weren't offered, or where only the liberal-arts AP classes were offered, I probably would have pursued a very different career path," Gardner says.

"We have so many young women who never thought they'd take an AP course," says Head of School and Principal Liz Swift '71, whose tenure has seen a dramatic growth in the numbers of young women taking AP and the variety of AP subjects available.

The Academy first offered an AP course in 1981. "By the mid-1990s," recalls Swift, "we had consciously set out to build the AP program in order to give our students more opportunities for advanced study and to increase their college-admission profile."

In May 2013, 400 HNA students sat for 858 AP exams in 16 different subject areas, according to Academic Mentor Jennifer Hawes. Since 9th-grade students don't generally take AP, that means some 82% of the eligible students in Grades 10 through 12 took at least one AP course. Many juniors and seniors take three or four.


Colleges Look for Rigor

Does taking AP courses offer students an edge in college acceptance? Nothing is automatic, cautions Dr. Alice Tanaka, one of the Academy's two College Counselors. "But the more selective the college is in the admission process, the more 'rigor' they expect in the student's course selections. AP courses provide students with that rigor or academic challenge," she says.


Unlike many schools, Holy Names Academy requires all students who take an AP course to take the College Board's corresponding national AP exam. Explains

Swift, "We made that rule because, otherwise, teachers are tempted to only want to have the best students take the national test. We wanted all our students to test nationally because it is a truer measure of our AP program."

Several other things make the AP program at HNA distinct, Swift says. "One is the tremendous access and success. Even though we don't just test the 'good'

students, we consistently have more than 80% of our tested students finishing with scores of 3 or higher." (The College Board grades AP tests from a low score of 1 to a high of 5.) In 2012, 87 percent of the HNA students who took AP exams scored 3 or higher. For all high schools in Washington, the average was 63 percent; nationally, 61 percent.

HNA Tech Pioneers: In Uniform and Full Habit

Long before the advent of AP Computer Science, a handful of HNA students helped pioneer the study of computer science at the Academy. Mary Kay Rauen Koon '73 recalls learning the early computer language Fortran in her junior-year calculus class, taught by Sister Catherine Ferguson, SNJM. "We would write our programs first as a flow chart, then in script, then go to Garfield High School and use their key-punch lab to punch our cards. The next week, we would get our printouts back with the result of our program.

"We would go to what was then Garfield's B Campus, their vocational school, where Washington Middle School is now. Walking into that campus in the morning, in our HNA uniforms with a nun in habit and veil, did not go unnoticed," Koon recalls.

Sister Catherine's innovative training paid off for Koon: after attending the University of Washington, she went on to a wide-ranging career in technology, one rare for a woman at the time, working variously as a network administrator, information-technology project manager, and tech consultant for organizations ranging from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and the Mercer Island Schools to Vulcan, Inc.—the investment and project-management home of Microsoft's other co-founder, Paul Allen.

"Learning how a [computer] program functions demystified technology and allowed me to approach it without any preconceived notions that it was complicated or difficult," Koon explains. "Fortran taught me how important attention to detail, accuracy, and punctuation are when working with an inanimate object."

Adds Swift, "We also offer an exceptional range of subjects, 16 this year, and that's been very important to us. There's not only the traditional Calculus and English, but also AP Art History and AP Psychology."

HNA Students Flock to AP Computer Science

The school's commitment to building a robust AP program is illustrated in the development of its AP Computer Science offering. Interest in the course from HNA's young women has exploded. This fall, a record 72 students will take it; 125 students applied—more than a quarter of all those eligible to try.

"One of the great things about teaching here is that Holy Names Academy students don't have any insecurities about trying something that might be perceived as 'dorky' or uncool," says Sam Procopio, the Math Department Co-Chair who teaches the AP Computer Science course in addition to Math and Entrepreneurial Studies.

In May 2012, Procopio's HNA students made up 18% of all the young women in Washington State taking the AP Computer Science exam. (Swift foresees that number doubling to about 35% in 2014.)

Procopio has come to anticipate the uncertainty of young women about learning the challenging Java computer language and of exploring the computer-science career field, one notoriously low on women. At the school's January "forecasting" assembly, an occasion for students to weigh their course options for the next academic year, he asked all the students attending to raise their hands if either of their parents, or the parents of close friends, work in technology—be it for Microsoft, Amazon, or one of the Seattle region's myriad other high-tech companies.

"A lot of students' hands went up,"
Procopio recalls. "I told them taking AP
Computer Science is a risk worth taking,
just to see if it's something you're good at, if
it's something you like. I love how valuable
this subject is. The world these young
women are entering has a need for people
who have at least some competency in what
computer science is all about, in how it
teaches logic and a way to think."

"There's a myth that you have to be a computer programmer when you take it. But a degree in Computer Science positions you to work for a successful company in any one of many areas, like marketing, because then you can communicate the technical side of the business in a way that not a lot of people have the knowledge to communicate," Procopio says.

Says MIT student Gardner, whose AP

courses at the Academy also included AP Computer Science, "Taking AP courses at HNA is an excellent way to challenge yourself and gauge your level of interest in a subject. Since they are some of the hardest classes that HNA offers, if you can take an AP course in one of your favorite subjects and still love that subject at the end, that's a pretty good indicator that you're actually interested in the material."

THE ORIGINS OF AP

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program was born in the 1950s in the wake of Ford Foundation studies that identified a need for American colleges and secondary schools to work better together to coordinate course work and to allow motivated students to advance more quickly.

One study, conducted by educators from three prominent college-prep schools and a trio of the nation's most selective universities—Harvard, Princeton, Yale—urged secondary schools to recruit imaginative teachers, encourage seniors to engage in independent study and college-level work, and undertake achievement exams that would allow students to enter college with advanced standing.

A second study by the Committee on Admission with Advanced Standing formulated a plan for developing college-level curricula and standards that could be instituted at the high school level. That group then recruited leaders in every discipline from the ranks of higher education to develop course descriptions and assessments that colleges would find rigorous enough to use as a basis for granting credit. A pilot program, launched in 1952 with study in 11 subjects, was taken over by the College Board in 1955 and renamed the College Board Advanced Placement Program.



Endowments

Named endowments are initially established at \$10,000 with a commitment to reach \$25,000 in five years. The annual income they generate provides tuition assistance for deserving students, or professional development opportunities for faculty and staff, or funding for service projects or other designated areas. When the principal in a fund reaches \$25,000, the annual income is awarded as a named scholarship.

Leontine Heritage Society

When the Styers made provisions in their estate plans, they joined the Leontine Heritage Society. This society recognizes those who have taken steps to ensure the future of Holy Names Academy, arranging for estate gifts to the Academy such as bequests, retirement plan assets, and charitable trusts. They have notified the Planned Giving Office of their plans.

Did you graduate before 1961?

The U.S. Congress has extended a law that allows the owner of a traditional or Roth IRA to make a tax-free transfer to a public charity, such as Holy Names Academy, through December 31, 2013.

- Donors must be at least age 70 on the date of the gift.
- Funds must be transferred directly to Holy Names Academy from the IRA or Roth IRA.
- Up to \$100,000 per donor may be contributed per year.
- The donor recognizes no taxable income on the transfer, but cannot claim an income tax deduction for the gift.
- The distribution can count toward the mandatory IRA withdrawal amount.
