Your legacy

has been a guiding light throughout this inaugural year. The values, traditions, and spirit you helped to build have been instrumental in shaping our school into the vibrant, nurturing educational community it is today.

The foundation of an HNA education is deeply rooted in the SNJM Charism and core values, which emphasize using our talents for the service of those in need. Service-learning is an important part of our Theology curriculum as you will learn in this edition's cover story. A Holy Names Academy graduate learns that serving others is not merely an act of kindness but a powerful expression of faith, compassion, and responsibility to the world around us.

Throughout my 28 years at HNA, I have been in awe of so many alumnae who have selflessly given of themselves to help others and make an extraordinary impact. As a sophomore, Laura Snowden La Rosa '09, worked with her youth group to help send supplies to those suffering in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina and successfully raised funds for the effort by selling t-shirts that she designed. She organized her youth group to not just send supplies, but to go and help rebuild homes in New Orleans. Since that time, hundreds of HNA students, parents, faculty, and staff have participated in this annual service trip to re-build homes. That effort has grown

into a non-profit organization called Shirts Across America, and they continue to help rebuild homes in response to natural disasters across the nation.

Mackenzie Jorgensen '16 also founded a non-profit organization, Women Advancing Tomorrow's Technologists (WATT), inspired by her junior service project of teaching middle school girls how to code. Through her service, she hoped to "spark early interest in computer science...and inspire future leaders."

It is an honor and a privilege to watch the young women of Holy Names Academy grow as individuals and build connections across communities that make a positive difference. Alumnae stories of service and leadership in various fields remind us that the lessons learned under the Dome extend far beyond graduation. The Class of 2024 is the newest group of alumnae ready for the world! We congratulate and celebrate them in this issue.

The theme of celebration continues as we honor Sr. Mary Annette Dworshak and Sr. Rosemary Perisich '56 for dedicating their lives to faith and service. Make sure to read their Q&A, which gives insight to their personalities and passions. Both Sisters have named endowments at HNA to support inclusive access to a Holy Names Academy education. EXTENDING A HAND



HNA STUDENTS SERVE THEIR COMMUNITY

Since opening its doors to young women 144 years ago, Holy Names Academy has worked to embody the legacy of the Sisters of the **Holy Names of Jesus and Mary** (SNJM) and the foundress of the congregation, Blessed Marie Rose **Durocher. At the heart of the SNIM** Charism ("charism" means a gift from God for the good of God's people) are the SNJM Core Values, which include a dedication to justice and service to people who are poor or marginalized. These Core Values continue to serve as guideposts for HNA's mission of inspiring young women of diverse beliefs and backgrounds to excel in life with confidence and courage, to think critically, act with purpose, advocate for justice, serve with compassion, and lead with integrity.

When Julie Tilghman, Director of Campus Ministry and Community Service (CMC), started teaching at Holy Names Academy in the fall of 2005, six Holy Names Sisters worked at the school, teaching and displaying the SNJM Charism and commitment to justice. Julie was immediately impressed by the students' deep understanding of social justice issues, both globally and locally. Today, the spirit and legacy of the Sisters are tangibly evident throughout the HNA community. Students are engaged and impassioned to address the needs of our time. They are committed to many of our society's most pressing issues, such as eradicating poverty, advocating for racial justice, promoting mental health, and caring for the environment.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

Under the Dome, service-learning is about much more than meeting the community service hour requirement students have had for many years. During the 2023-24 school year, HNA students volunteered collectively for over 19,000 hours. Seventy students received a varsity letter in service, an acknowledgement that they volunteered over 100 hours during the school year.

The Campus Ministry Department supports students in their community engagement in a myriad of ways. Each September, students attend a Service Fair, which helps them connect with various organizations that seek high school volunteers. This year, the Holy Names Academy Parent Board

Aria Lewis '24, a former CMC Officer, reflects on her participation in the pilot service-learning program and her time at Fred Lind Manor:

"I was drawn to this pilot service-learning program because I felt it would give me the opportunity to help the community. I met amazing people who had so much knowledge to share, and who also allowed me to share some of my knowledge with them. With the service opportunities and CMC work, HNA has shown me what a blessing it can be to help others. At Fred Lind, the residents go on and on about how amazing our school is and the wonderful people who make HNA what it is."

Rowan '26 shared her prior experience participating in the SNJM Shared Mission:

"This trip changed the perspective I have on the world. I had never been to Eastern Washington, never lived on a farm surrounded by animals, and had never volunteered at a food bank or met an indigenous elder. It helped me grow and become a more aware and well-rounded person. It ignited a passion in me for serving others and instilled an openness for how I can learn from those I encounter in service. It affirmed my love of the goodness that lies within each and every person on this earth, and reminded me that community can always be found—even in the most unlikely places."

and Campus Ministry Department collaborated to offer weekend volunteer opportunities, such as sorting food at the University District Food Bank and constructing tiny homes with Sound Foundations NW.

THEOLOGY CURRICULUM

Social justice is infused into HNA's Theology curriculum, helping students put faith into action in meaningful ways. Students identify social justice issues, brainstorm creative solutions, challenge common assumptions about issues, and implement projects to address the needs of the community. For example, this year, one Junior Theology class collected basic necessities to support migrants and refugees living at a church in Tukwila. A Senior Theology class coordinated a clothing swap, donating the proceeds to an organization that serves refugee families. Other classes collected socks and underwear for a local school and coordinated a food drive for a local food bank.

Most recently, the Theology department designed and piloted a course for seniors that incorporated service-learning into the school day. Twice a week, seniors left campus during their Theology class to volunteer at local partner organizations—including retirement homes, schools, and a food bank. Julie Tilghman, who coordinated the service-learning partnerships, noted, "After just a one-month trial, student volunteers and their supervisors raved about the program. Students were excited to serve their community during the school day, putting their thoughts and plans into action. Supervisors at our partner organizations expressed deep gratitude and admiration for our student volunteers."

Because this pilot course was so successful for the students and organizations alike, it is now a class offered to seniors called "Contemporary Problems with Service-Learning." The seniors who take the class volunteer at places such as Fred Lind Manor, Hilltop House, St. Joseph School, St. Therese Catholic Academy, Seattle World School, Lowell Elementary School, St. Mary's Food Bank, St. Francis House, and the Experimental Education Unit at the University of Washington.

SERVICE TRIPS

Last summer, 30 students and four faculty members dedicated a week to serving the wider community in Washington State. In The Agape Service Project, a program run by Kelsey Harrington '05, students learned about the farm-working community in Whatcom County. Students volunteering in the Ignite Program partnered with the Intercommunity Peace and Justice Center and students from eight other high schools to integrate service, leadership, and spirituality. Finally, students participated in the SNJM Shared Mission trip, which connected HNA students with students from other SNJM schools, as they volunteered and partnered with the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary and SNJM Associates in Wapato, Washington.

Demonstrating care and concern for others is not just a display of the SNJM values, it is a thread that runs throughout the HNA community and sets it apart from others. The spirit of community service is thriving at Holy Names Academy, thanks to the strong foundation set by the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary and the continued passion of HNA's students and faculty.

CREATING A HOME UNDER THE DOME

Inspired by this year's school-wide theme of "Creating a Home Under the Dome," and the school's mission "to serve with compassion," HNA's Parent Board partnered with Sound Foundation NW to provide opportunities for HNA's students and parents to build transitional tiny homes in the organization's Seattle warehouse, warmly nicknamed, "The Hope Factory." Titania Limanardja, parent of Cleia Yuniardi '24 and Parent Board member who managed this partnership, noted that physically building homes for the marginalized was the perfect way to live the theme of this school year, outside the walls of the Academy.

In addition to volunteering to build tiny homes, the HNA community raised more than \$7,000, which volunteers presented to Sound Foundations NW during their final volunteer shift. Because the donation was made during GiveBIG week, every dollar donated was matched at \$2.50, and HNA's donation became \$18,394—enough to build four tiny homes! Volunteers had the honor of naming a home, "the Skipper House," in celebration of the Class of 2024.



ENDOWMENT SPOTLIGHT



With over a century of combined time spent under the Dome, one would be hard-pressed to venture through Holy Names Academy's history without encountering Sister Mary Annette Dworshak, SNJM or Sister Rosemary Perisich, SNJM '56. Beloved and well-known in myriad roles—classmate, Sisters, teachers, mentors, and volunteers, just to name a few—these two women have devoted their lives to the Academy's mission. For many years, the Sisters lived in community across the street from HNA. Today, they live ten minutes away in a senior living high rise on First Hill in Seattle. Now that they are officially "off the clock," we saw an opportunity to learn more about these two multifaceted women.

What is something most people might be surprised to find out about you?

Sister Mary Annette (SMA): I love to travel. As a child, going to visit relatives meant being in the back seat of our family car squeezed between my sister, Bernadette, and uncle, John. We had no air conditioning, only windblown hot air through the windows. Each trip brought the treasure of family history, I realize today!

My travels have taken me to many places in the U.S. for graduate studies. The

topics I focused on include the Bible, Black women in American literature, Mormon women in literature, and some science fiction as well.

I would say Vietnam was the one and only place where I "escaped from the convent" when I rode on the back of a motor scooter clinging to my young driver, who was giving me a scenic, scary tour of the city amidst roaring traffic, blaring horns, and noisy buses.

Sister Rosemary (SR): In college, I taught myself how to write upside down—in cursive, of course! To keep

myself entertained in a less-thanstimulating history class, I started taking notes upside down. Later when I became a teacher, I would sometimes start writing upside down to see if students were paying attention. It always surprised them!

If you were hosting a dinner party and could invite three famous people (living or dead) who would you invite, and why?

SMA: I would invite women's and civil rights activist Fannie Lou Hamer, humanitarian and former First Lady

Rosalynn Carter, and founder of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart Frances Xavier Cabrini. These are my discussion questions as we enjoy tea and watch the sun set over the Olympic Mountains: What should be evident in school curriculum about equity, diversity, inclusion, and justice? Who is responsible for determining that? How would you address global migration, realizing that thousands are moving due to poverty, climate, war, and unjust infrastructures? How would you recommend welcoming others to engage in these difficult conversations?

SR: My first guest would be attorney, author, and former First Lady Michelle Obama. I have such admiration for her. My second guest would be longtime Jeopardy! host Alex Trebek. My mother loved Jeopardy! I admired that Alex continued to host even after his cancer diagnosis because it truly showed that life goes on. The third guest at my dinner party would be Pope Francis. He is such a happy person. His position allows him to be an honest role model; even if people do not agree with him, they respect him because of how he

lives his life. All three of these people are versatile, resilient, and clearly love life. I have always believed that there is a difference between existing and living. My dinner guests operate in the latter category, and I would be delighted to spend a joyous evening in their company.

What book or movie do you find yourself returning to time and time again?

SMA: Instead of a single book or movie, I am perpetually drawn to works that explore my areas of interest: mainly history, and the consequences and effects of historical events. As such, I have always enjoyed the PBS period dramas All Creatures Great and Small, Call the Midwife, and World on Fire. More recently, I have been fascinated by Christopher Nolan's movie, Oppenheimer, and Sarah Rose's book, D-Day Girls. Both Nolan and Rose explored old documents and interviewed survivors or their descendants, bringing new insights to light regarding atomic weapons, Nazi propaganda, and women's roles throughout history.

SR: Austrian psychiatrist and Holocaust survivor Viktor Frankl's Man's Search for Meaning is an incredibly powerful book. I share his view that the greatest of all freedoms is the ability "to choose one's attitude in any given set of circumstances." Frankl's book precipitated a long-standing assignment in my junior Theology class. I encouraged students to ask someone: What gives life meaning? I really wanted them to push themselves and pose this question to a person whose reply they may not be able to guess. One student wrote to Johnny Carson, who responded on his show! His answer? "Money!"

If you were a member of this year's graduating class, what field of study or career path would you be interested in pursuing?

SMA: The U.S. Census Bureau projects that by 2034, for the first time in our country's history, there will be more people aged 65 and older than children in the United States. Since I am especially concerned about this "graying" of America and of the world, as well as the continued inequity in economic support of women who

are burdened as caretakers within their families, I would pursue a career combining law and health care management.

SR: If I were graduating this year, I would like to become a doctor. I have long had a deep appreciation for the medical field. To me, it is a ministry of healing. My experiences with doctors, nurses, and others working in hospitals and clinics have always been positive, and my doctors especially have reinforced my appreciation for life. I make a point to write "thank you" notes to my providers to express how grateful I am because I believe that gratitude creates an important link between people.

As longtime members of the HNA community, you have had the opportunity to watch the Academy blend its rich tradition with the changing times. Tell us about one change that has made you the happiest or proudest.

SMA: I am proud that Holy Names Academy's commitment to nurturing student voices for social justice and leadership in this realm continues to evolve and strengthen. I have seen evidence of this in school prayer services, student leadership, service projects, and field trips. It is inspiring to see students advocating for justice and emerging as leaders both within and

outside the walls of the Academy.

SR: Blessed Marie Rose was a woman of service, and while service has always been part of the HNA curriculum, I applaud the increased focus on studentled service over the years. So often when I talk to alumnae about their Holy Names Academy service experience, in their maturity, they realize that they truly received a gift through their service requirement. The spirit of service instilled in them during their high school years stays with them and becomes a part of their lives forever. It is wonderful when giving time and talent to others can be viewed as a two-way street; not only are you giving, but you are also benefiting.

You each have played such an important role in the lives of students and alumnae. How do you see your role changing and evolving now and into the future?

SMA: Throughout my 47 years under the Dome, I saw my role as someone who believed in encouraging the voice of each person by teaching students to use research and experience to inform their writing and speaking. It was rewarding to examine many complex moral issues in my classes over the years.

Now that I am no longer in the classroom, my encouragement remains strong, yet manifests in a different way. I hope others will join me in supporting my family scholarship endowment at HNA, the Sister Mary Annette Dworshak, SNJM Scholarship, to give incoming students the opportunity to achieve their goals of shaping a more compassionate and just world guided by the Charism and values of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary.

SR: I continue to support Holy Names Academy students by participating in appeals for financial aid, and I will always do everything I can to champion the community. I joyfully worship the God of surprises, seeking his wisdom and wit in the ways that life unfolds. Although I am not sure what God has in store for me, I am gladdened that the *Sister Rosemary Perisich*, *SNJM '56 Scholarship* will continue to provide for students even after I am not able to.
