Dear Alumnae and Friends,

ast fall we enjoyed the grand opening of our new cafeteria, which our students have appropriately renamed the HNA Café. Before school, at break, during lunch, and after school, the new Café is alive with students enjoying the warm and welcoming atmosphere of this completely renovated space— to say nothing of the new technology, seating, and expanded food service. It has become a gathering place for students to relax and connect with their peers. Hospitality is a key value of the Sisters of the Holy Names and their schools and ministries. We are very pleased to take a step forward in providing our students with a space that encourages stronger personal connection and sense of community.

This summer, we will break ground on an exciting new project that will take HNA to the next level of a student-centered campus—while retaining all of the historic features we currently enjoy. A new, three-story building will be constructed that links our main building to the gym. It has been thoughtfully designed to integrate well with the original 1906 building and the 1990 gymnasium. We are not expanding the size of our student body, but we are creating new spaces that will enhance the student experience at HNA.

Plans for the new building include:

Basement level: Fitness room • Additional entrance to cafeteria • Cougar kiosk sales First floor: Student commons Second floor: Two conference rooms to relieve our library from its current, frequent use as a testing and meeting space.

In addition to the new building, we will renovate the library and add a fully accessible elevator in the main building along the common wall adjoining the new facility.

Thanks to the strong response for our *Transcend: Beyond Excellence Campaign*, we have a solid base to begin this project. We will continue to raise funds for it throughout this year and next. Proceeds from last December's Deck the Dome will support the library renovation, and proceeds from this year's CHEER! Auction in March will support the installation of the new elevator.

Watch for the next issue of the Columns for updates on the progress of this project!

In other news, HNA Cougar teams are in the midst of another championship-banner year. Volleyball won both the Metro League and Sea-King District championships (the first District crown in the volleyball program's history). In cross country, Jordan Oakes '17 swept the State, District, and Metro first-place medals and was named Gatorade Washington State Runner of the Year; as a team, HNA's cross country runners took eighth at State. Eleven Cougar swim/ dive athletes advanced to their State tournament, as did HNA soccer. And this just in: HNA gymnasts have won the Metro League gymnastics championship for the third year in a row.

In an unprecedented honor, no fewer than 44 of our visual art students participated in a solo showing of their art at the Seattle Art Museum throughout the month of January. I hope many of you had an opportunity to sample the work of our many amazing young artists.

Thank you for your interest and support of our beloved Academy.

HNA Represented at SNJM Youth Justice Forum

In July 2015, four HNA students travelled to Montréal, Québec with HNA Social Studies teacher and alumna, Abby Drake '96, to participate in the 3rd Youth Forum. Students and teachers from 13 SNJM-affiliated schools located around the world joined together to learn about key social issues being addressed by the Sisters of the Holy Names including human trafficking, water as a right for all, and immigration. During the week–long forum the students made presentations, discussed issues, and participated in several service projects in the greater Montréal area. The students and Abby felt the memorable experience was enriching and life-changing. It provided an understanding of the essential common values of the SNJM sisters and their commitment to service and social justice.

A SPACE FOR COMMUNITY AND CAMARADERIE: New HNA Café Opens to Raves

tudents gaped in disbelief in September at their first glimpses of the new HNA Café—the basement cafeteria space previously known to five decades of Academy students for its lessthan-charming décor, barracks-like seating, and limited menus.

The space's transformation during the 2015 summer break is dramatic.

- Handsome new terrazzo flooring.
- Increased natural light and new LED fixtures.
- Choices of booths or café-style seating.
- Significantly expanded food-service area, created by expanding the footprint into what were once the senior lounge and a laundry area (in boarding-school days).
- Wall-mounted, flat-screen TVs.
- New grab & go food stations with new, healthy-menu choices, instanthot stations, and expanded selfservice stations, with high-efficiency microwaves.
- Abundant charging stations for digital devices.

A Celebration of Gratitude

he Academy's Annual Giving program kicks off each year with a celebration for donors in gratitude for all that they do to support the school and the mission of HNA. The 2015 event, at Sand Point Country Club in September, gathered parents of current students, alumnae, alumnae parents, and trustees for a lovely dinner and program. The Annual Giving program is an important part of HNA fundraising, providing financial aid for over one-third of students; enhancing faculty, staff, and coaches' salaries; maintaining the historic building; and supporting special projects. The 2015-2016 goal for Annual Giving is \$675,000.

Eva Strickland '03, Alumnae Board and Annual Giving Committee member, began the evening's program with a prayer. The featured speaker was alumna Christen Heye '09. While a student at HNA, Christen participated in varsity volleyball and the Student Ambassador program, and was a co-valedictorian. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Boston College in 2013, and went directly into BC's Graduate School of Nursing, earning a Master of Science in

Nursing as an Adult-Gerontology Primary Care Nurse Practitioner last May. Christen moved back to the Seattle area and is currently employed as a Nurse Practitioner on the Heme Malignancy service at the Seattle Cancer Care Alliance, where she works with patients undergoing treatment and surveillance for cancers of the blood and bone marrow.

Christen spoke of her time at HNA as one of great growth, of being challenged academically, spiritually, and as a leader. "Looking back," she said, "the knowledge and values instilled in me during my four years at Holy Names have allowed me to become the ambitious, faith-filled, fiercely loyal, and open-minded woman that I am today." Giving is generally perceived as an act of selflessness. But to alumnae parent John Holt (Gemma '13, Katrina '15), support for a Holy Names Academy scholarship endowment—like the Holt Family Endowment he and his wife, Susan Trainor Holt, established—is garnished with a dose of self-interest.

"We give for two reasons, one out of gratitude, the second out of self-interest," Holt told an October gathering of more than 100 donors and many student scholarship recipients at the annual HNA Endowment and Scholarship Reception.

The Sifferman Family Legacy



n 1998, Stan Sifferman established the Carrie O. Sifferman Memorial Scholarship at Holy Names Academy. He named the scholarship after his mother as a way to honor her, his sisters, and the generations of Sifferman women and relatives who have attended HNA over the years. From that first gift, Stan became an ardent and regular supporter of the Academy, encouraging his extended family to join in underwriting the endowment. For years, members of the Sifferman family have made donations to honor Stan's birthday, Christmas, Father's Day, and other special occasions.

Stan Sifferman

In his early years, Stan was taught to serve his community, and, by a lifelong example, he taught his own family the same lessons.

Stan Sifferman's father, Karl, died in 1930 at age 43, leaving his widow, Carrie Ohmer Sifferman, to raise 11 children, ranging in age from 20 to a child who would be born several months after Karl's death. Stan was the eighth child, not even 5 years old when his father died. Shortly after her husband's death, Carrie and the children moved to Capitol Hill and St. Joseph's Parish.

Not surprisingly, they were a close-knit family. Stan had six brothers and four sisters. Three of his four sisters would graduate from Holy Names Academy: Ruth Sifferman Kearny '36, Edna Sifferman Lemeshko '41, and Carrie Sifferman Johnson '44.

Stan attended St. Joseph School and Seattle Preparatory School, graduating from the latter in 1943. After service in the United States Marines during World War II, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Meteorology from the University of Washington. Stan worked in his chosen field until 1961, when the health of his daughter, Peg, a 1972 graduate of HNA, and his wife, Kathleen Sheehan Sifferman '37 required a move back to Seattle and a change of careers. Stan took a job at Boeing, working there for almost 30 years before retiring in 1990.

Stan further inspired the family to celebrate and honor another strong Sifferman woman who was shaped at the Academy – his brother Tom's wife, Bette Loggins Sifferman '41. After years of contributing to the scholarship named for their grandmother Carrie, Bette's children encouraged her to establish a separate scholarship—and all of her children continue to follow Stan's lead by honoring their own mother through the Bette Loggins Sifferman '41 Scholarship Endowment.

As for the Carrie O. Sifferman Memorial Scholarship, its corpus now stands at over \$100,000, a testament to the dedication of the extended Sifferman family and a true legacy for Stan—who died on October 14, 2015 at the age of 90. A new generation continues what he started, ensuring that countless HNA students to come will continue to benefit from the exceptional Sifferman generosity.

IRA CHARITABLE ROLLOVER EXTENDED INDEFINITELY

Congress first passed the IRA charitable rollover legislation in 2006 to enable individuals to make contributions directly from their IRAs to a public charity. Congress recently passed a bill that allows the owner of a traditional or Roth IRA to make a tax-free transfer of up to \$100,000 to a public charity, such as Holy Names Academy. This is now a permanent tax provision, retroactive to January 1, 2015.

Here are the Internal Revenue Service requirements:
Donors must be at least age 70 ½ on the date of the gift.

- Funds must be transferred directly to Holy Names Academy from the IRA or Roth IRA.
- Up to \$100,000 per donor may be contributed per year.
- The donor recognizes no taxable income on the transfer, but cannot claim an income tax deduction for the gift.
- The distribution can count toward the mandatory IRA withdrawal amount.

KATE CAUSBIE'S DEDICATION AND COMMUNITY SERVICE EXPERIENCES ARE INSPIRATIONAL.

hile attending Wittenberg University in Springfield, Ohio, from 2010 to 2014, Kate participated in the university's Inside-Out Prison Exchange course, held at the local Juvenile Detention Center. As an outcome of the course, the Restorative Justice Initiative was established to provide a unique and profound learning environment for "inside" and "outside" students alike. Kate served as an intern, and worked to develop restorative practice workshops for children in Springfield City Schools. As a volunteer, she trained as a facilitator during the first semester of the project.

In 2014 she was honored with the Charles J. Ping Award for her outstanding leadership and contributions to community service and service-learning on the Wittenberg campus and its local community. This student-service award is sponsored by the Campus Compact, an organization of 43 Ohio colleges and universities, to recognize involved and dedicated undergraduate students.

After graduating from Wittenberg, Kate served in Springfield as an AmeriCorps VISTA member at an assetsbased poverty alleviation non-profit, the Springfield Promise Neighborhood. She worked as Health and Wellness Leader in direct connection with under-resourced families. Promise serves the attendance zone of an elementary school that is home to the city's most vulnerable children; 100% qualify for the federal free-lunch program.

In Memoriam: Sister Ann Cornelia Sullivan, SNJM '56, 1938–2015

Excerpts from reflections by Liz Eldredge Swift '71, Head of School and Principal:

S ister Ann Cornelia Sullivan, SNJM '56 faithfully and lovingly served Catholic schools for 52 years; the last 36 were at Holy Names Academy.

In those years, she held many different leadership positions; she served as an administrator, taught history, and often was called on to "pinch hit" in a variety of capacities. However, she began her career at Holy Names and ended her career in a position where she was a rock star—as a librarian.

Sister Ann was an avid reader with a surprisingly wide range of interests—and her book recommendations, which were many, were always spot on.

Sister Ann also had a deep commitment to the SNJM Charism, and actively lived her faith through a life of service. She had an incredible sense



of service, an openness to change and progress, and a wonderful sense of humor. She was always willing to pitch in and help wherever needed—on the CHEER Auction, Deck the Dome, computer training, proctoring tests, assisting in the Attendance Office, or serving on a myriad of committees and not just at Holy Names, but for the Archdiocese, on accreditation teams, and on regional librarian associations. She spent summer after summer training countless teachers in the Archdiocese in computer skills.

A passion of Sister Ann's was the Holy Names archives, which she lovingly collected, organized, and cataloged. She has left us an amazing legacy of knowledge of the SNJM Charism and history of Holy Names Academy.

Most of all, she left us with the model of a life well lived: even as she faced her final transition in this world, she was positive, humorous, and faith-filled. Thank you, Sister Ann. We will miss you.
