Dear Alumnae and Friends,

As we head into the summer months, I am so grateful to the many students, parents, teachers, staff, and supporters who made this past school year successful. Despite the many adaptations, HNA was able to offer a full program of academics and activities—some virtual and some in-person. Thanks to everyone for their flexibility and ingenuity. While we will likely look back on this year as a time of great challenges, I also believe that we will carry forward some of the lessons learned and be a better school and community in the years ahead.

A highlight of the year was the opening of the Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Athletic Complex and Underground Parking Garage. HNA Crew, a non-league sport, also enjoyed a spring season of practices and competitions.

This year also saw the passing of our dear friend and supporter, Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee '47. Her leadership, devotion, and generosity were instrumental during a pivotal time in the Academy's history, and her commitment to the mission of HNA remained steadfast throughout the years. Serving as President of the HNA Board of Trustees in the 1980s, she set the school on the trajectory to become the exceptional school it is today. She was an inspiration to me and to so many others.

After many virtual events this past year, we were so pleased to have an in-person Commencement ceremony for the accomplished Class of 2021. On June 3, 179 students graduated at T-Mobile Park. It was a celebration like no other this year, and I am grateful to our alumnae participants. Cindy Oh Lohman '80, President of the HNA Board of Trustees, opened the ceremony with the Invocation; Julia Reed '05 gave the Commencement Address; and parents DaVonna Nathan Johnson '90 and her husband, Del, offered the final blessing.

Finally, I give a shout-out to my fellow Pipers from the Class of 1971 on the 50th anniversary of our graduation. I look forward to gathering in person at a future date for a reunion and celebration of friendship and life. You are the best!



BUILDING THE LEGACY

HNA'S NEW ATHLETIC COMPLEX & UNDERGROUND PARKING GARAGE OPENS

"The new athletic complex is so beautiful and contemporary for the new generation, yet still feels like Holy Names Academy. It really is a tribute to the HNA legacy," marveled Vice Principal of Student Life Kim Dawson as she entered the new space for the first time.

Holy Names Academy's new Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Athletic Complex and Underground Parking Garage, which beautifully matches the spirit and style of HNA's historic building, was completed in January 2021.

Tasked with the challenge of creating a modern facility adjoining a 113-year-old building, Broderick Architects and Andersen Construction certainly rose to the occasion. With its modern design, beautiful landscaping and lighting, and useful features, this building project—the Academy’s largest and most ambitious since the completion of its historic building—was designed to ensure the long-term sustainability of Holy Names Academy. “This project is a dream come true for the long-term future of the school. I am so appreciative of everyone who made it possible,” says Head of School & Principal Liz Eldredge Swift ’71. The project began in June 2019 with the demolition of the 1990 Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Gymnasium, followed by

the excavation process to prepare for the garage. Construction began in the fall of 2019 and was paused for six weeks in the spring of 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite this delay, the project proceeded under budget and on schedule, and the new facilities opened in January 2021. Students, faculty, and staff who have returned to school for in-person learning are now parking in the garage, and student athletes are competing in the athletic complex. Accommodating 243 cars, the new underground parking garage helps HNA remain a viable destination for young women throughout the Puget Sound region as parking availability in the surrounding neighborhood continues to decrease. The new parking garage

contains many important features including electronic vehicle charging stations, an entrance and exit car counter, heated ramps for ice and snow, bumpers on every column, double-striped parking spots, gates, cameras, emergency phones, and lighting throughout. The new 19,000-square-foot athletic complex will support HNA’s thriving athletic program, which has grown to an incredible 26 teams. It also provides more space and amenities for HNA’s P.E. and health programs and all-school assemblies. Other notable features include a weight room, athletic training room, classroom and office space, team meeting room, locker rooms, and increased gym seating, court space,

and storage. And demonstrative of the thoughtful planning of this complex, the solar panels installed on the roof of the athletic complex generate enough electricity to light the entire structure.


When the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary opened Holy Names Academy's school building on Capitol Hill in 1908, it was the culmination of a process driven by growth in the school and the city of Seattle. The Sisters' objective was to ensure the long-term sustainability of Holy Names Academy. In opening the Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Athletic Complex and Underground Parking Garage, Holy Names Academy carries on the Sisters' mission of educating young women for generations to come.

A TRIBUTE TO

JEANNE MARIE MCATEER LEE '47

Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee, a beloved Holy Names alumna from the Class of 1947, passed away on January 16, 2021. Jeanne Marie was born in 1930 and was raised on Capitol Hill in Seattle. She attended Holy Names Academy and then Seattle University, where she sang opera and graduated with a degree in English. While at Seattle University, Jeanne Marie met the love of her life, Rhoady Lee, Jr. Jeanne Marie and Rhoady married and raised six children together. Rhoady passed away in 2012. Love of family and love of God were Jeanne Marie's guiding principles throughout her life. She attended Mass at Sacred Heart Church in Bellevue and was a voracious reader, who had a deep appreciation for education.

Jeanne Marie and Rhoady were lifelong supporters of Catholic education. They

received the Elizabeth Ann Seton Award from the National Catholic Education Association, as well as the St. Ignatius Medal from Seattle University. Jeanne Marie served on the Board of the *National Catholic Reporter*. She was also an enthusiastic supporter of the arts and regularly attended the Seattle Opera, the Seattle Symphony, and events at the Seattle Art Museum, and served on the Seattle Youth Symphony Board.

Jeanne Marie was a devoted alumna of Holy Names Academy, giving of her time, talent, and treasure over many years. She served as President of the



Board of Trustees and was instrumental in securing HNA's future during pivotal times in its history, providing invaluable guidance and leadership. Jeanne Marie and Rhoady contributed generously to Holy Names Academy and sponsored the building of the Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Gymnasium on the site of

the former tennis courts in 1990. HNA is proud that the new Jeanne Marie McAteer Lee Athletic Complex will carry her name into the future. Jeanne Marie's spirit and devotion had a significant and lasting impact on Holy Names Academy, and her legacy will live on in our hearts and on our campus.

In anticipation of this \$36.8 million dollar building project, Holy Names Academy carefully saved \$28.4 million over the course of many years and in early 2019, launched the capital initiative ***Foundation for the Future: The Campaign for Holy Names Academy*** to raise the remaining \$8.4 million. After a successful lead gift phase of the campaign, HNA deliberately suspended all fundraising efforts in March 2020 due to the financial uncertainty many HNA community members faced during the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the temporary suspension of the campaign, construction and funding of the project continued so that the project could remain on schedule and on budget. Holy Names Academy relaunched fundraising efforts in August 2020, and thanks to the hard work of the campaign committee members—including several alumnae—and the generosity of the HNA community, HNA has raised ***\$7.6 million of the \$8.4 million goal to date!***

Alumnae participation in the campaign has been inspiring, with 24% of all gifts to the campaign coming from alumnae. The single largest gift to the campaign to date is a \$500,000

gift from alumna Camilla Manca Tilford '64. HNA is so grateful for the continued support of its alumnae community.

HNA STUDENTS RETURN TO IN-PERSON LEARNING

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, the resilience, flexibility, and resourcefulness of the HNA community have been apparent. Students transitioned from online learning to in-person learning in a 50%-hybrid model in February 2021. Through both online and hybrid learning, students demonstrated remarkable ingenuity, excelling in coursework, participating in clubs and extracurricular activities, and engaging with classmates.

Faculty mastered the difficult art of simultaneously teaching students in person and on Microsoft Teams. Staff and administrators worked hard to adapt the operations of the school to comply with ever-changing guidelines established by Washington State and King County health officials. Donors gave generously to support students with financial need. Because of the participation of the entire community, HNA has been able to continue

providing real-time, quality instruction, student activities and social interaction, and meaningful engagement between students and teachers throughout the pandemic, factors that are critical to effective learning and adolescent development. While the past year has been challenging in countless ways, there are certainly some silver linings—the resiliency of the entire HNA community being one of the brightest.

Commencement ceremonies for the HNA Class of 2021 were held at T-Mobile Park on Thursday, June 3 at 1:00 p.m. HNA secured this premier outdoor space in partnership with other Seattle Catholic high schools. T-Mobile was able to adapt the graduation ceremony to comply with safety guidelines for COVID-19. HNA was honored to welcome alumna Julia Reed '05 as this year's Commencement Speaker. Julia has spent her career in politics, government, and public

service. She currently works as a Consulting Manager for Kinetic West, a social impact consulting firm based in Seattle and previously served as a Senior Policy Advisor in the Office of Mayor Jenny Durkan and as a political appointee in the Obama Administration. She holds a Master's in Public Affairs from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of International and Public Affairs and a B.A. in Government from Smith College. Julia is also a member of HNA's Alumnae Board.

179

All 179 members of the Class of 2021 chose to continue their education at a four-year institution. They were admitted to 223 different institutions, of which they chose to attend 89—located in 29 states, the District of Columbia, and five foreign countries.

76%

76% of the Class of 2021 collectively received offers of academic scholarships and awards totaling \$38.6 million. Approximately \$6.77 million of the awards will be used to fund their educations.

2021 TOP 10%

77 members of the Class of 2021 received the Washington State Honors Award. The award is given to the top 10% of seniors in the State of Washington on the basis of SAT or ACT scores and an unweighted grade point average. With the absence of test scores this year, students had to meet certain course requirements in mathematics and English. Over 43% of our seniors ranked in the top 10% of the students in Washington!

INSPIRED TO GIVE BY HER COMMUNITY OF HNA ALUMNAE

To Mary K Rauen Koon '73, Holy Names Academy represents community—a web of deep relationships and unexpected connections, both personal and professional. Growing up in the same neighborhood as HNA meant that attending the Academy was a family affair. Mary K's aunt graduated in the early '40s, her cousin attended the grade school, and other family alums include cousins ('68 and '70), her daughter and niece in the late 90's, and a niece in 2012. Mary K's lifelong friendships, which blossomed at the Academy, are celebrated at an annual luncheon, a tradition started their junior year. And much to her delight, Mary K has met HNA alumnae in the workplace, at PTA meetings, and at volunteer activities.

Mary K knows that it is not by coincidence that these HNA alumnae have in common a strong sense of self, leadership qualities, and a generous spirit, motivated to lead lives with purpose and integrity. These values are instilled by the Academy. Even Mary K's aunt, Kathleen Rauen '41, was a role model for independent women during her generation, working as a wheat buyer for General Mills in Seattle, Los Angeles, and the Bay area. With a desire to help young women find their voice—a value Mary K cherishes about the HNA

education and experience—Mary K felt compelled to deepen her philanthropic commitment to the Academy.

When her niece and goddaughter, Betsy Arntz '99, passed away unexpectedly in 2010, Mary K established an endowment in her memory. Betsy was cut from the same HNA cloth. Intellectually curious, graceful, and kind, Betsy was dedicated to her career at the Fred Hutch Cancer Research Center and her volunteer efforts with the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Betsy's family believes that her happiest years were spent with her friends at the Academy.

Mary K has quickly grown Betsy's endowment through her employer's generous charitable giving program. Not only does the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation match all Mary K's gifts at a rate of three dollars for every one dollar contributed, it also matches her volunteer hours in the community.

As she continues to grow the Betsy Arntz '99 Memorial Scholarship Endowment, Mary K appreciates the Academy's continued commitment to economic diversity—a commitment that benefits the entire student body, not just those receiving financial aid, by providing opportunities for students to

CONTINUING HER FAMILY'S COMMITMENT TO CATHOLIC EDUCATION

For Annette Lund '67, joining the HNA Legacy Society was a decision steeped in family tradition, a way to honor her Swiss-Italian family. Her grandfather was an immigrant farmer that strongly valued Catholic education. Despite their modest beginnings, her grandfather ensured that all five of his children attended Catholic schools, often asserting that the best money he ever spent was on Catholic education. Annette's mother, Emma Codiga Lund, was similarly a champion for Catholic schools and the student body president of her beloved Immaculate Conception High School, Class of 1939. Inspired by her mother, Annette joined the Legacy Society to continue her family's longstanding commitment to Catholic education. The inheritance from the sale of her grandfather's farm, passed down from generation to generation, will be the legacy Annette leaves to HNA—the gift that keeps on giving.

Annette also established an endowment in her mother's name, the Emma Codiga Lund '39 Memorial Scholarship, to ensure that students receive an excellent education at the Academy regardless of

their family's economic circumstances. Emma was so proud of her Immaculate education, reuniting with her classmates annually until her death in 1989 at age 68 of multiple myeloma. Likewise, Annette's HNA community has been her anchor during the COVID-19 pandemic. Emailing almost daily, her lifelong HNA friends have been a source of strength while she has worked on the front lines during the pandemic. Annette works

part time in her "retirement" as a Nurse Practitioner at Harborview Medical Center's Family Medicine Clinic. We are so grateful for Annette's dedication and service to the community and HNA.

WHAT ARE THE BEST PARTS OF YOUR LEADERSHIP ROLES?

In my experience, the best parts of serving in leadership roles are: inspiring a shared vision, motivating others to action, creating opportunities for others to grow and lead, advocating for those who have been marginalized, and uplifting the voices

of those who have been silenced. I am particularly committed to leadership for mentoring students and creating spaces for diversifying STEM education and career opportunities in my professional and volunteer roles.

HOW DID HNA PREPARE YOU TO BE A LEADER? IS THERE A PARTICULAR PERSON IN YOUR LIFE WHO INSPIRED YOU?

HNA prepared me for a life of servant leadership, with God as our ultimate servant leader. The Bible says, "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute. Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy." - Proverbs 31:8-9

HNA taught us that the possibilities are endless for girls and women to lead as God blesses us with our gifts and talents. In an all-girls school, every leader is a young woman! The top scholars, athletes, and student organization leaders are all girls! You learn quickly how the possibilities are endless and we all have God-given gifts we can share to bless others. I remember in my freshman year, Sister Rosemary Perisich

approached me quietly on a bus full of rowdy young ladies excited for our field trip to the Puyallup Fair and whispered in my ear, "Exercise your leadership." I knew that meant I should step up and take responsibility for encouraging my peers to quiet down so the driver could focus on getting us there safely. So, I did. That was a pivotal moment for me to know that I could have such an influence on my classmates by encouraging them to settle down. The strong upbringing from my parents and the leadership development I received at HNA put me on a trajectory where servant leadership is part of my DNA and my lifestyle.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR UPCOMING LEADERS AND/OR STUDENTS?


