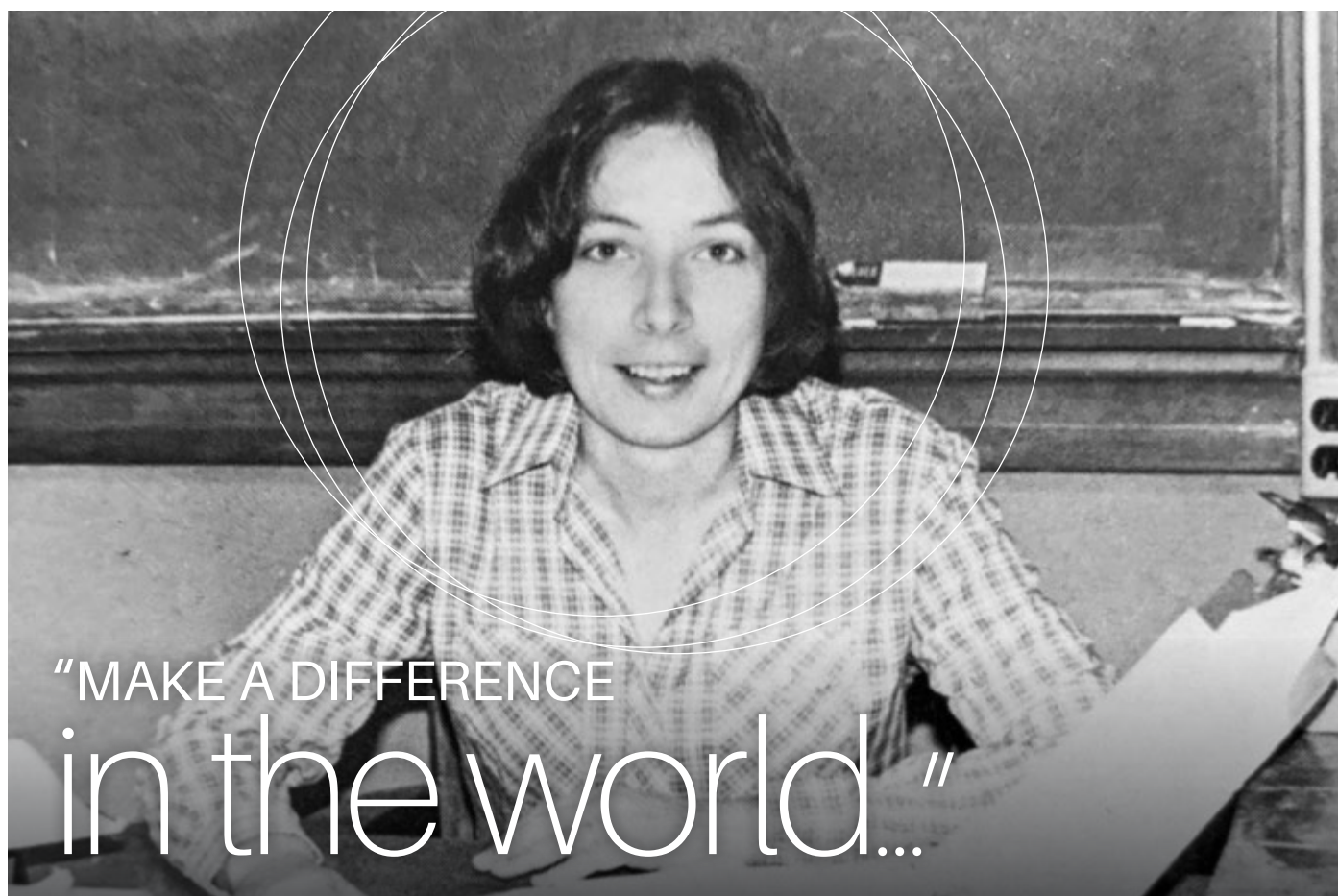
THE TRADITION OF EXCEPTIONAL LEADERSHIP CONTINUES AT HOLY NAMES ACADEMY.

Liz Swift, who retired as Holy Names Academy's Head of School and Principal in June 2023, and Kim Dawson, who now serves the Academy in this important role, embody Ralph Waldo Emerson's idea of leadership. When they each arrived at HNA as young teachers, neither Liz nor Kim aspired to become HNA's Head of School. Rather, they came with the purpose of supporting and inspiring the Academy's young women and contributing to

the Academy's tradition of academic excellence. Over time, both women became leaders at HNA, dedicated to the Academy's mission, and were asked to serve as Vice Principal and ultimately selected to be Head of School and Principal. When Liz became the first lay woman to lead the Academy, she began carving out the trail that would someday allow Kim, also a lay woman, to be Head of School. Now, as the first Black woman to serve the Academy as Head

of School, Kim's trailblazing continues. Liz and Kim have inspired countless young women to consider the path they may be on and encouraged them to leave their own trails as leaders in their communities.

As the HNA community says goodbye to one exceptional leader and welcomes the next, it is indebted to both of these women for their contributions and applauds them for diverging from the path to create and inspire new trails.



After an extraordinary 48-year career at Holy Names Academy, Liz Swift is the longest-tenured employee in HNA's history. With every role she took on, Liz worked tirelessly to further HNA's mission and champion women's education. Under her leadership, HNA has grown to become an academic powerhouse, thoroughly preparing its young women for college and beyond. Liz was long committed to ensuring this excellent HNA education is accessible to a wide range of students. This year alone, HNA awarded \$2.22 million in financial aid—an incredible figure made possible by Liz's strategic stewarding of resources, forward thinking, and championing of HNA's endowment program.

Liz is also a strong supporter of STEM education, having taught mathematics and physics throughout her career.

Regardless of how busy Liz became with her leadership commitments, teaching her AP Physics class remained one of her joys and priorities. To ensure that HNA's strong STEM programming continues long beyond her tenure, Liz established a STEM endowment, which has already grown to more than \$400K, thanks to the generous support of the HNA community.

Liz's impact goes far beyond HNA's historic walls. She has been a leader in the education community, chairing and serving on multiple boards throughout the greater Seattle area. Her mentorship and wisdom is routinely sought by educational colleagues.

How did you become Head of School and Principal?

I was invited to serve as an Interim Vice Principal of Student Life in 1982 and found that I enjoyed the opportunity to strengthen and create programs that

enhanced the student experience. I was named the permanent Vice Principal of Student Life in 1985 and then the Vice Principal of Academics in 1986, a role that I continued until 1995, when I was named Principal. While I missed full-time teaching, I enjoyed the administrative work and the challenge of moving the Academy forward.

What was your favorite part about working at HNA?

I have always loved the community, especially the students. HNA has had a strong culture of welcome and inclusion where students are encouraged and supported in developing their unique talents and gifts. It was a joy to experience their growth and discovery. I especially enjoyed experiencing that growth as a physics teacher for 48 years, and I am most grateful that I had the opportunity to teach during all my administrative years.

As you look back at your career at HNA, what makes you the most proud?

The alumnae community. It is inspiring and gratifying to hear and witness all the good work our alums are doing to make this world a more inclusive, just, and kind place. It seems that everywhere I go, our alums are leaders in their community, work, and families.

Tell us something about HNA that is not well known.

Physics was not a common subject in any high school in 1908 when the current Academy building was completed, especially not at a girls' school. How incredibly visionary of the Sisters of the Holy Names to have a science laboratory dedicated to physics. The next time you step into HNA's physic lab, think about this wonderful legacy.

What do you hope for the future of HNA?

The school has thrived with strong leadership dedicated to the mission of HNA and the SNJM Charism at every level from the Board of Trustees to faculty and staff, alumnae, parents, and students. May the next generation of

leaders be inspired by the mission and culture of the school and adapt and change as our world and the needs of the students evolve.

What are the qualities of Kim that will serve her well as HNA's Head of School and Principal?

Kim is very mission-centered and lives the SNJM Charism and Core Values in all she does. She is always focused on what is good for students and is ever willing to try a new approach or program. Under her leadership, I know that the school has a strong future, and our students will thrive. I look forward to seeing the growth of the Academy in the years ahead.

Do you have any advice for students?

Make a difference in the world and in your relationships, be your genuine self, develop resilience, and live in gratitude—and my hope and dream are that you will live a life of great meaning and purpose. Please enjoy the inspiration that I have loved

in the simple and powerful words of Mary Oliver in her poem *The Summer Day*:

*"Tell me, what is it you plan to do
With your one wild and precious life?"*

And, I would add, that God has given you.

Will we see you at alumnae events?

Absolutely!





When Kim Dawson arrived at Holy Names Academy in 1996 as a student teacher through Seattle University's Masters in Teaching program, she could not have envisioned the significant role Holy Names Academy would go on to play in her life, and indeed, the lasting impact she would have on the Academy. Sitting at her interview with Liz Swift and Sr. Mary Annette Dworshak, SNJM, Kim was grateful for the opportunity to teach in an all-girls school, which reminded her so much of her own high school. She was delighted to be hired as a student teacher and the following year, as a full-time English teacher. Through hard work and a fierce commitment to HNA's mission, Kim quickly became a leader in the community for both students and colleagues. When students wanted to start the first Black Student Union at HNA, they asked Kim to be their mentor, and she gladly accepted, ensuring that the students felt heard and supported.

Kim became Vice Principal of Student Life in 2003 and continued to be a passionate advocate for HNA's young women, as she planned student life programming, ran student clubs, moderated ASB, and responded to student needs. She has been a much-loved teacher, colleague, and administrator, committed to advancing HNA's mission while centering the SNJM Core Values. Now, as she serves the Academy as Head of School and Principal, Kim reflects, "My leadership will center on the collaborative values of service and community partnership." She looks forward to continuing to build relationships with HNA's community members to ensure the successful future of the Academy and its students.

What brought you to HNA 27 years ago?

I wanted to be a teacher since I was in second grade. I went to an all-girls Catholic high school, Notre Dame Academy in Los Angeles, where I grew in confidence through my participation

in co-curricular activities such as student leadership, vocal ensemble, and cheerleading. The school awards I received reflected my love of service and hospitality. I was voted the friendliest in my class all four years, and I cherished my high school experience. I wanted to teach in a similar community in which I could give back and encourage young women to find their confidence and passion, so Holy Names Academy was the perfect fit for me.

Tell us a fun fact about you that people may not know.

I am a huge Disney fan! I love everything Disney. In fact, I have Disney posters for every season that I put outside of my office. I love bringing elements of fun into school for students to enjoy.

What inspires you?

Making a positive difference and helping others inspire me. The Core Values of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary, which are grounded in faith and action, also inspire me and shape our school culture.

What excites you most about being Head of School and Principal of HNA?

I am excited to advance the mission, keep the legacy of the SNJM sisters alive, and nurture a community where young women thrive. We are in a time of such innovation, and yet, the SNJM Charism remains timeless. Holy Names Academy is a supportive community built upon academic excellence, beloved traditions, leadership opportunities, and a sisterhood that encourages young women to find joy and belonging in their learning and in life. It is my honor to now serve as its Head of School and Principal.

What is one of your goals for HNA?

Our 21st-century world is demanding, and the mental health and well-being of our students, faculty, and staff need to be supported more than ever. One of my goals is that HNA continues to provide its young women with an excellent academic program while increasing opportunities for students to grow socially and emotionally.

What lessons from Liz's leadership are you taking into your own leadership?

I learned so much from Liz in my 27 years at HNA, but the two things have had the most impact on me that I will continue in my own leadership are commitment to the mission and empowering women. Liz's example of uplifting women throughout her tenure at HNA was both inspiring and transformational. She has a gift for encouraging potential in others and providing opportunity for their success and impact in the world.

How do you see the all-girls advantage play out at HNA?

I see it every day as young women become more confident in who they are. They are not afraid to take risks, to discover their passions, and to try new things. They are part of a community that encourages and supports them, and they are surrounded by examples of strong women leaders through the curriculum, their teachers, and the alumnae. I saw the impact of the all-girls experience on my own daughter, Ariana



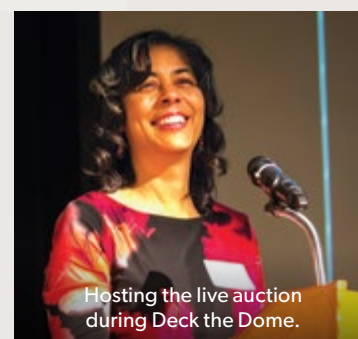

JONNIKA KWON '25

An active junior at HNA, Jonnika Kwon, has earned varsity letters for golf and community service and is a member of HNA's Mock Trial team and National Honor Society. Pursuing her interest in government, Jonnika recently had the opportunity to serve as a page in the Washington State Senate and provides her insight into her experience as a page and as an HNA student.

What inspired you to apply for the Senate Page Program?

I am very interested in politics and government so a family friend, Senator Javier Valdez, recommended that I apply for the program. Before paging, I was not very familiar with the state government because I mostly followed Congress and federal politics. I thought this would be a great opportunity to learn what's happening at a local level. Ever since paging, I have been much more involved in state politics, which is actually the best way to make a tangible difference—all politics are local, after all!

How has HNA helped shape you into the student and person you are today?

The teachers at HNA have been incredibly supportive of me, both in the classroom and outside of school. My English teacher, Ms. Draggoo, has really encouraged my passion for political advocacy and has assisted me with extracurricular projects. I have found fellow students who share my passion for political organizing and have enjoyed collaborating with them to raise

awareness and take action on different issues. Plus, I am taking AP Government and Politics this year—it's a class I've wanted to take since 8th grade!

"We participated in a mock committee hearing and answered questions from our colleagues about our bill. Like in the real legislative process, it had to receive a majority in the committee to move onto the next phase of passage. The bill was unanimously passed out of committee! Drafting this bill gave me insight into just how hard it is to write legislation that is realistic, feasible, and will have public support. There is a big difference between just having a good idea (i.e., eliminating gender inequality), and actually outlining how we will achieve the goal with specific, attainable actions."

JEN KELLY

Jen (Curran) Kelly has been teaching at Holy Names Academy since 1997. Throughout her 24 years at HNA, Jen has used her endless energy and passion for teaching to help shape the Social Studies Department into the dynamic and engaging department it is today. She currently teaches Advanced Placement United States History

and Advanced Placement American Government and Politics. This past summer, Jen was selected to attend the prestigious Supreme Court Summer Institute in Washington, D.C. The Institute offers teachers the opportunity to study recent Supreme Court cases in detail and learn innovative teaching methods for conveying this information to students.

How were you first introduced to the Advanced Placement Government and Political Science course?

In the 2018 - 2019 school year, our department wanted to offer AP Government and Political Science as an elective for students. I worked diligently that first year teaching the course, and in the process, I discovered that I loved teaching United States government and politics. I was so drawn to the curriculum, which includes instruction on how the Supreme Court operates and review of significant Supreme Court cases. Now there are two of us who teach this course to juniors and seniors.

What are your goals for your students in AP Government and Political Science?

In this course, my goal is to provide my students with the tools necessary to be active citizens and participants in our democracy. Furthermore, I seek to provide them with skills to navigate difficult conversations so that they feel confident engaging in well-informed political discourse.

What skills do you hope your students take with them beyond HNA?

I hope I instill an appreciation and better understanding of our history and political system. Furthermore, my goal is to prepare my students for their futures, providing them with strong writing, critical thinking, and study skills to feel confident and successful in college courses. I see my impact when former students tell me about their successes in college or their career and share how confident and prepared they were because of what I taught them at HNA.

ENDOWMENT SPOTLIGHT

REUNITING WITH CLASSMATES AND SUPPORTING HNA STUDENTS FOR GENERATIONS TO COME

MEMBERS OF THE CLASS OF 1971 AT THE 2023 ALUMNAE LUNCHEON.



If you think about your senior year of high school, what song comes to mind? For HNA's Class of '73, these lyrics take them back: "I heard he sang a good song, I heard he had a style, and so I came to see him, to listen for a while."

When Roberta Flack's hit song was playing on repeat over the airwaves, the Class of '73 likely could not imagine gathering under the Dome 50 years later to celebrate their reunion. On May 20, 2023, they shared memories, ate, drank, and caught up with each other. They also chatted with student ambassadors to learn more about HNA student life today, covering topics such as mock trial's recent state competition, how to decide which AP courses to take, the ways that students connect across class years, and the "thrill" of navigating the parking garage with a newly minted driver's license.

During a break in lunch, Mary Sherman '73 reminded the group of their class endowment, which she and her classmates started after their 40th reunion. Now funded at \$43,000, the revenue that is generated each year from this, and other HNA scholarship endowments, plays a crucial role in achieving the Academy's continued commitment to economic diversity.

The Class of '71 also used their 40-year reunion as impetus to establish a scholarship endowment. With a goal of \$50,000 by their 50th reunion, the class was thrilled when they reached more than \$75,000 in 2021. This past spring, the class coalesced for another funding push to honor their classmate Liz Swift '71. Together, Kimberly Habenicht Brown, Lisa Healy Crump, Melinda Iacolucci, and Judy Gallagher Miller sent a message to their classmates requesting

support for the endowment, stating, "Our plan is to present at the alumnae luncheon on Saturday, March 4, 2023, to let Liz know that her classmates have made tribute donations in her name. Hopefully, we can announce a new corpus that exceeds \$100,000."

Sure enough, they did it! The endowment total for the Class of '71 stands at over \$105,000. Thank you to all HNA alumnae and friends who empower current and future HNA students with your generous support of the Academy's mission. HNA students regularly express their appreciation for the opportunity to learn from peers with a wide range of experiences and perspectives. Incredibly, 112 middle schools and 86 zip codes are represented within HNA's student body. Your collective generosity makes all the difference!

HNA celebrated its 40th annual CHEER event on Saturday, March 25, raising funds for the Academy's exceptional students and programs. The HNA community honored Liz Swift, Head of School & Principal, with the Blessed Marie Rose Award for her remarkable commitment to HNA's mission and students throughout her almost 50-year tenure.

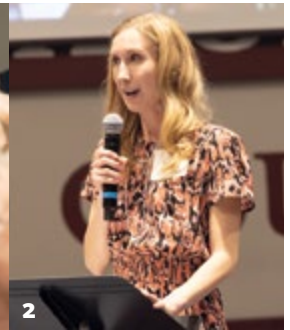

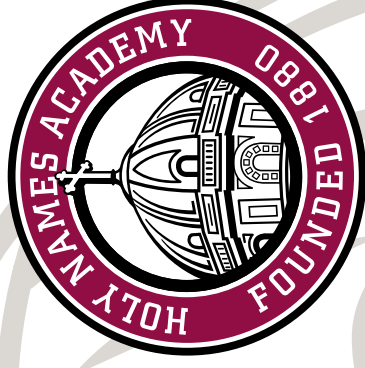

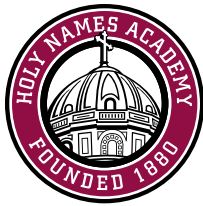
