Various committees of the Board as well as a faculty committee will be contributing to the plan and a Steering Committee chaired by trustee and alumnae parent **Craig Wainscott** will oversee the process. All aspects of the school will be examined for future needs and trends: Mission and Identity, Curriculum and Program, Facilities and Technology, School Image and Marketing, Alumnae Relations, Development, Finance and Investment.

In late winter or early spring, we will invite the larger HNA community to give input through a survey tool. When you receive notice of this survey, we would greatly appreciate your participation. As alumnae and friends, you have a unique experience of the core values of the Academy. Your thoughts and ideas will assist us as we shape the Academy of the future.

HNA, Online and Ready for its Close-Up

A new admissions video goes live on the Web to capture the excitement and unique spirit of life under the dome.

You have just minutes to describe the essence of Holy Names Academy to a curious stranger. Make that a 13-year-old stranger—the easily distracted kind. Ready?

Easy. Just click the video link on the Holy Names Academy website homepage —or look on YouTube—and let dozens of current and recent HNA students do the talking for you. Eight minutes and hundreds of choice video vignettes later, your adolescent will have a healthy taste of the excitement, opportunity, and unique spirit of an HNA education.


The Academy's new admissionsrecruiting video debuted on the Web in

October (the exact address is www. holynames-sea.org/ Media/HNAVideo. wmv; on YouTube, search for Holy Names Academy). Although targeted foremost at middle-schoolers and their parents contemplating high-

school choices, the eight-minute video is a vibrant, fast-paced introduction to the Academy circa 2011 for anyone curious about life under the Dome.

"With the popularity of websites like Facebook and YouTube, people are uploading videos every second of the day," says Admissions and Marketing Director Michelle Basilio. "The video gives people an opportunity to get to know us, which encourages them to come for a visit or check out an open house—or it's a chance for an alumna to reconnect with her school."

The video has no narrator and no written dialogue, only the unrehearsed voices of HNA students and young alums. "We don't script anything, our students





just speak from their hearts and share about their experience and what makes it special," Basilio says. "What I

often find is that our school is very different from what a 7th- or 8th-grade student had originally imagined."

The video's producers, Seattle-based Quantum Productions and Stendal Productions, spent hours inside the school over the 2009–2010 academic year, filming students and teachers in actual classroom situations. Additional half-days were devoted to capturing athletic and social events, such as the annual HNA/ O'Dea New Family Picnic. The narrative flow is woven from one-on-one interviews, conducted with a wide range of students in the Le Sorelle Music Center's recording studios.

"For us, being able to work on a school video, interviewing such sharp, interesting

students, is pure joy," says producer Becky Stendal. "Holy Names Academy is the one place we are allowed to really unleash our creativity, and that makes the process so worthwhile."

Capturing the essence of a 131-year-old Academy for tech-savvy young women of the 21st century is a tall order. "You really can't bottle and market the experience at Holy Names Academy," Basilio says, "but you can give a glimpse of it. And now we're even working with our videographer on the idea of filming in 3-D for the next version!"

A Legacy of Creative Stewardship: Preserving the Dome

When the job soars 145 feet into the sky, a squeegee on a stick won't suffice.

leaning the Academy's towering landmark dome may seem at first glimpse a prosaic task. But when it rose to the top of the school's housekeeping to-do list for summer 2010, the Board of Trustees Building Committee turned to innovative solutions—in keeping with a custom of dedicated, sometimes creative stewardship of the school's historic building. In this case, it was spend more to save more. And hire a bunch of mountain climbers.

"The dome is such a big part of our school and our identity," explains Darren Briner, Director of Information Technology and School Plant. "It makes a huge impression on people. And it was starting to look run down."

About a dozen years ago, serious leaks in the 42-foot-diameter dome had to be sealed. Addition of waterproofing material stemmed the leaks, but also had the unfortunate downside of making the roof sticky—accumulating dirt and grime that gradually contributed to the appearance of a dowdy dome. "We've tried numerous approaches to cleaning it over the years..."

The Fruits of Stewardship

A checklist of the most recent major projects to keep HNA's historic building thriving as a 21st-century education center:

- SMART Boards installed in all classrooms
- Hardwood floors refinished
- New Business Office spaces built; Auction Office renovated
- Security upgraded (cameras, cardkey entry)

• All electrical services consolidated

- Studio art labs renovated and technology integrated
- Computer lab and classroom hardware and software upgraded

"We've tried numerous approaches to cleaning it over the years, but just couldn't get the results we really wanted," Briner says. "So this year, the Building Committee made the decision to go ahead and repaint the entire dome. And by

changing the material to a new paint that has a dirt-repelling gloss on it, we hope that simply cleaning the dome every year will get a lot better results."

By using a higherend gloss paint, the Building Committee hopes to see substantial savings on the cost of maintaining the dome in future years.

Current members of the HNA Building Committee are Jim Bradley, Phil

Hasenkamp, Ed Pillitteri, Mark Smedley, and Craig Wainscott, as well as three members of the school staff: Briner, Principal Liz Swift '71, and Business Manager Dorothy Crean.

The twin commitment to savings while maintaining stewardship of the Academy building similarly inspired the choice of a small, Seattle-based firm of mountain climbers to perform the summer's dome work.

To erect temporary scaffolding around the dome would cost the school upwards of \$50,000. By instead employing CTB Consulting—a Seattle-based firm whose

> expertise in highaltitude climbing has helped hang banners at Safeco Field and paint TV transmission towers atop Queen Anne Hill—the school solved another maintenance puzzle and provided quite a summer viewing spectacle for its Capitol Hill neighbors (see cover photo).

"It is a core tenet of our school's mission statement," says Principal Liz

Swift, "that we are pledged 'to preserve the lasting values of our tradition while we design the Academy of the future.' One of the most visible and tangible signs of that commitment is in the innovative work of our Building Committee and the school's dedicated maintenance staff."

All Things Under the Dome


How well do you know HNA's dome?

- From the roof of the building, the dome rises 48 feet; the cross atop the dome ascends another 20 feet. From the top of the cross to ground level is 145 feet.
- The dome was not an addition; it was part of the original plans for the Academy, designed in 1905 by architect Albert Breitung and completed in 1908. The interior of the dome is entirely constructed of fir wood.
- The familiar Christmas lights, as well as the cables and pulleys that support them, remain in place year round. Replacing the cable rigging was part of the summer 2010 dome renovation project.
- The annual tradition of lighting the Christmas lights during the Deck the Dome celebration—an honor for which supporters vie at the annual CHEER! Auction—requires the winning bidders to actually climb into the dome. That's where the only electrical switch for the lights is found.

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- Academic Office software upgraded (PowerSchool online grade system)
 First-floor hallway flooring replaced
- New classroom desks installed
- Reception, Planned Giving, Executive Assistant offices renovated

- Dome exterior repainted with dirt-repellant material
- Lighting system on dome replaced
- Gymnasium roof replaced
- Admissions and Assistant Principals' offices renovated
- Library hallway flooring replaced



Viewpoint: Above the Dome—How Did We Get These Photos?

Since 1908, the Holy Names Academy dome has been a constant in Seattle's ever-changing skyline, but vantage points for capturing it on film are limited. The most common images are shot from the ground up—where tree branches interfere with a clean shot. Limited views of the dome can be captured from windows on the fourth floor of the building; for those with a telephoto lens, the water tower in Volunteer Park offers an eastward-facing skyline view.

After the completion of its power washing and repainting in summer 2010, the landmark was ready for its close-up. Sandy and Fred Cavazos, parents of Raquel Cavazos '12, are

owners/operators of Above the Rest Aerial Photography, Inc., and the professionals who undertook the unusual photo shoot. Fred Cavazos arrived at HNA on a sunny, windless summer morning, parked his vehicle in the back lot, and proceeded to unload an18-foot, non-motorized, helium-filled blimp from



inside the covered trailer. The patented, self-leveling blimp system remained tethered to him, allowing maneuverability. Suspended from the blimp was a remote-controlled, high-resolution digital camera; a wireless transmitter enabled Cavazos to compose images from ground level, thus providing extraordinary views of the dome.

Above the Rest Aerial Photography, Inc. has offered a unique perspective to aerial photography in Seattle and the Greater Puget Sound area since 1995. The couple composes low-level aerial photographs that showcase private and commercial real-estate buildings and property. They are able to photograph at low altitudes, from 10 to 500 feet, much lower

"HNA shapes our young women to be the best that they can be, not only for themselves but also for others," Cindy Lohman said. "I think it's contagious to want to help and inspire other women."

During her two-decade-plus career as a regional sales manager for Xerox, she said, "The relationships formed at HNA helped me in the business world and personally. I knew how to work well with women and truly wanted to help mentor other women who I knew had the potential for greatness."

Daughter Cara told the gathering that after just one year walking under the Dome, she, too, has begun to feel the special connection to a tradition of values and inspiration that is the hallmark of an Academy education. Her aunt, Diane Oh Yee '81, also attended HNA along with sister Cindy.

"Sometimes when I am walking on the second floor," said Cara Lohman, "I can't help but think about how many

The Goldsmith Heritage

The association of Hugh and Annajean "Skitty" Goldsmith with Holy Names Academy—43 years and counting—began when their first daughter, Jill Goldsmith Routt, enrolled in 1967. Jill '71 was followed by Dorothy '78, Nancy '80, and Janet '86. Then came the granddaughters: Monica Routt '96, Alyson Routt '00, and Dorothy Routt '03 (Jill's daughters); Joanna Suelzle '05 (Nancy's daughter), and Aubrey Goldsmith '05 (daughter of Kathleen Schwaegler Goldsmith '77).

When Hugh and Skitty's daughter Dorothy died in a tragic accident in 1982, memorial gifts were directed to a future scholarship. Skitty passed away in 2008, followed by Hugh in August 2010. Gifts

in their memory have helped augment the Goldsmith Family Endowed Scholarship, which will benefit young women at the Academy in perpetuity. The endowment came full circle in October 2010 when Janet Goldsmith Cleary met the first Goldsmith Scholar at the school's annual Endowment Reception.

Notable Women 2011 Distinguished Alumnae Named

The Distinguished Alumnae Selection committee has selected Sister Jean Fallon, MM '47 and Pamela Hyde Gibbons '76 as the honorees for 2011. They will be honored at the annual Alumnae Luncheon in March. (For luncheon details see page 18.) Sister Jean Fallon will be recognized for Achievement in Professional Career and Pamela Gibbons for Outstanding Commitment to Community.

Sister Jean Fallon has devoted her life to peace and justice issues. After graduating from the Academy, she entered the novitiate of the Maryknoll Sisters in New York City. While there, she studied Japanese at the Yale University Institute of Foreign Languages, then moved to Japan where she served various parishes of the Kyoto diocese for 23 years. During a return to the U.S. of several years, she joined the World Awareness Group that fostered better understand of global situations. Returning to Japan, she continued her dedication to peace and justice issues, serving on the Catholic Justice and Peace Committee, the NCC Peace and

Nuclear Issues Committee, and several subgroups of the Peace Committee. Sister Jean currently works in the Maryknoll Office for Global Concerns at United Nations headquarters in New York. Last year, she travelled to Palestine with the Christian Peacemaker Team three times, and is involved with Israeli/ Palestinian solutions.

Catching Up With...

Father William Treacy— HNA's Chaplain from 1952 to 1964



Some 300 guests joined Father William Treacy at Seattle University in October for a 50th-year celebration of *Challenge*, an award-winning, 30-minute program that aired weekly on Seattle's KOMO-TV on Sunday evenings from 1960 to 1974. The premise of the ecumenical program was to build a better understanding of different religions. Father Treacy

was appointed by Archbishop Thomas Connolly to serve as a panelist, along with Rabbi Raphael Levine and Protestant minister Dr. Martin Goslin. For 14 years, the three discussed religious issues through an interfaith dialogue, always respecting the views of each other.

In 1968, Father Treacy and Rabbi Levine began a multifaith retreat center near Stanwood, WA; it is now known as Camp Brotherhood. The non-profit retreat center is an inclusive, interfaith organization that offers facilities for educational, spiritual, and experiential programs. Some 130 non-profit groups utilize the facility annually. Over the years, buildings and outdoor facilities were added to the center. They included overnight accommodations, a dining hall, chapel, swimming pool, soccer and football fields. Today, the former dairy farm remains a hobby farm with vegetable gardens and farm animals.

On January 1, 2011 Camp Brotherhood became the Cascadia Center at Camp Brotherhood, forming a partnership with Seattle University School of Theology and Ministry to bring new programs and communities to the center. The event at Seattle University

included a call to support this new venture.

Now in his 90s, Father Treacy continues to inspire others toward world peace through our interconnectedness, by our actions and faith. He offers this prayer that expresses the foundation of interconnectedness:

Father, the hand of your loving care extends beyond the boundaries of race or nation to the hearts of all who live. May the walls which prejudice raises between us crumble beneath the shadow of your outstretched arm.
